CAMP UNDER QUARANTINE — As a result of the regrettable death of James D. Keenan yesterday from spinal meningitis the military training camp, Beach Grove Inn, has now been placed under quarantine. How long the camp will be quarantined depends on the length of time taken in stabilizing the throats of the trainees now training there. Each man will have two swabs taken. Dr. B. C. Keating, Deputy Minister of Public Health, stated. The above case has been the only one discovered so far, although previously there had been several cases of mild influenza. Dr. Harold Shaw is expected from Nova Scotia shortly to assist in the medical work of the camp. Mr. Keenan's death was the first to take place since military training began there in October.

Cheques Presented To Red Cross Society At Pleasing Function Yesterday

The Canadian Red Cross rooms were the scene of a pleasing and interesting function yesterday evening when Dr. F. W. Routley, National Commissioner of the Red Cross Society was presented with a cheque for \$1000.00 by the purchase of an ambulance for war work, the money being raised through the efforts of the Carry On Canada Corps of Charlottetown.

After the chairman had extended thanks to the Canadian Legion for the use of their rooms for the Red Cross Work, His Worship Mayor Campbell of Summerside made his presentation of a cheque for \$1000.00.

In making the presentation to the chairman His Worship said, this work was drawing the people into the line—in politics or religion. He referred to the two cartons of clothing recently presented to a foreign steamer docked at a wharf here, when the captain presented the men with the contents—warm clothing, mufflers, etc. He said the reaction was most gratifying. Some of the stories told by those men who had been through the war were "hair raising."

Dr. MacMillan on behalf of the Red Cross extended thanks to the people of Prince County. He said the cheque was giving a good account of themselves, and mainly through the efforts of Mayor Campbell.

A similar vote, moved by G. P. Hutcheson and seconded by W. J. Brawlers, was extended to the Carry On Canada Corps for their magnificent gift of an ambulance during the war.

On being called on by the chairman, Dr. Routley reviewed the work of the Red Cross, stating there are now at least a million adult members and 650,000 junior members in Canada.

He visited Britain since the outbreak of the war and said the morale of the British people is wonderful. There are now 180,000 unimpaired women doing work formerly performed by men.

Thousands and thousands of cases of comfort and food are being sent to the people of England by the Red Cross which must be most gratifying to the people of Canada. There have not been in England, Scotland and Wales which is one large battlefield, but he added, "The Britons are standing up to it."

As an example of British bravery he referred to the action of the captain of the Jersey Bay, who with the wheel of his ship sending her into the jaws of death, to give the other ships a chance to escape—that was the world can produce. Dr. Routley declared.

At the conclusion of his address he answered several questions put by Dr. MacMillan regarding Red Cross matters.
