**Presbyterians
Nearing End Of
Deliberations**

CALGARY, June 12 — (CP) — The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church decided today to send three delegates—two ministers and a layman—to the General Council of the Alliance of Reformed Churches.
The three official delegates being sent at the expense of the Church are Rev. W.W. Bryden of Toronto, Rev. C. Ritchie Bell of Montreal and Prof. B.C. Diltz of the Ontario College of Education at Toronto.
Another Canadian Presbyterian, Rev. Dr. George H. Donald of Montreal, will preside at Geneva, since the president died during his term of office and Dr. Donald is immediate past president.
Next General Assembly will meet at Knox Church in Toronto, in June, 1948.
This morning the few commissioners who remained to deal with the 25 items still on the docket of business heard the appeal of two basement churches for assistance. The case of St. Andrew's Church at Moncton, N.B., and St. Andrew's Church at Saskatoon were referred to the Board of Administration for sympathetic approval, and with recommendations that the board be given power to advance a loan of up to \$50,000 in each case.

**Report Critical
Shortage Of Men
For The Ministry**

SACKVILLE, N. B., June 12 — (CP) — Critical shortage of men for the ministry has created a serious situation, Rev. Dr. W. S. Godfrey, Maritime superintendent of Home Missions, told the Maritime Conference of the United Church in annual session here.
A report today revealed that the following seven candidates have been recommended for ordination by the conference: William Bell, Thomas Stuart Bells, Eldon Archibald Gunn, Neil Stuart MacDonald, Colin Douglas Nickerson, John Thomas Stewart and Arthur Frederick Whiston. Mr. Nicholson was wounded three times in Italy and received the Military Cross.
Dr. Godfrey reported 109 charges without ministers, 31 served temporarily, 63 served by laymen, 18 by supernumerary ministers, 20 new charges which should be constituted and 15 larger churches seeking assistant ministers.
"There is an annual decrease of 95 ministers," he said. "In all our theological colleges there are only 48 graduates for the ministry. There is need for a nation-wide campaign for recruits for the great vocation of the ministry."
Rev. A. A. MacLeod, Whycomagh, N. S., chairman of the Home Mission Committee, announced progress in advancing ministry salaries toward the official minimum of \$1,800.
Rev. D. M. Sinclair, Sydney, reported on the work of the community house in that city.
Dr. A. E. Betts, Saint John, described home Sunday School work in communities lacking regular Sunday Schools in the winter months. The conference endorsed this work and agreed to support the cost.
Rev. K. M. Findley, of Cap Aux Os in the Gaspé region of Quebec, reported progress in that most isolated charge of the Maritime conference.
Two couples under appointment for India, Rev. and Mrs. P. S. MacDonald and Rev. and Mrs. A. T. Embury were introduced to the conference by Rev. R. D. MacIntosh, Stellarton, chairman of the Overseas Mission Committee. He also presented Miss Dulcie Cook, under appointment to Japan. The conference greeted Miss Adella J. Archibald, Truro, N. S., retired after 40 years service in India.
Mr. MacIntosh said the Church was spending an inadequate \$440,000 on overseas missions.
"The rehabilitation of our Chinese work alone would cost \$2,000,000. We have barely begun to restore the depleted staffs of our war-ravaged mission fields. Evangelists, doctors, nurses and agricultural experts are needed. The doors of opportunity for our mission workers are wide open. The people are hungry for the gospel of hope. The Church members

**Big Nova Scotia
Debenture Issue**

HALIFAX, June 12 — (CP) — Tenders for \$10,200,000 debentures of the province of Nova Scotia were opened today by the provincial treasurer and a syndicate headed by Wood Gundy Corp. Ltd., of Montreal, was named the successful bidder. Three syndicates, representing 30 bankers and brokers throughout Canada, submitted tenders for the bond issues.
The syndicate awarded the tender bid for \$100,339 for the combined issue composed of \$5,000,000 of 20-year non-callable serial debentures and \$5,200,000 of 21-year 2-3-4 per cent sinking fund debentures redeemable after June 16, 1966.
The one to 10 year serial debentures carry coupons of two per cent. Eleven to 15 year carry coupons of 2-3-4 per cent. Serial debentures mature in blocks of \$250,000 per annum.
Overall yield to the province from the successful tender is 2.61 per cent, marking the first time in the province's history that a bond bearing an interest rate lower than three per cent has yielded the province a price better than par.

**Forsees Union Of
Baptist Conventions**

HAMILTON, June 12 — (CP) — The possibility of a union of all Baptist conventions in Canada and their more than 1,100 churches was forecast at the 59th annual assembly of the Baptist convention of Ontario and Quebec at McMaster University today by Rev. Dr. G. C. Warren, of Acadia University. He told the assembly that the infant Baptist Federation of Canada had "already made it possible for Canadian Baptists to speak with one voice."
The Federation which was formed in the 1940s in 1944 after years of negotiations, which opened in 1900 at Winnipeg, was becoming the co-ordinating agency of the conventions, binding together their work through such national

**S'side Man
Found Guilty
Of Robbery**

After deliberating for fifty minutes a trial jury found Lawrence Cahill of Summerside guilty of robbery with violence at the conclusion of his trial in the Supreme Court at Summerside yesterday. He was remanded till June 20th for sentence.
The trial arose as the result of Mr. Lewis MacArthur of Summerside being assaulted and robbed of approximately \$300.00 to the rear of Holman's Ltd. store in Summerside on the evening of May 24th. Two defence witnesses were heard yesterday before the case concluded, Irving Casey and the prisoner himself.
Mr. W. E. Darby, K.C., represented the Crown and Mr. J. S. DesRoches, K.C., appointed by the Supreme Court, represented the prisoner. Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy presided.—S.

**Address Read To
Mr. Justice Tweedy**

When the Supreme Court opened at Summerside yesterday morning, Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., on behalf of the Bar Society of Prince County, read the following brief address to Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy, who was presiding.
"On this your first appearance in Prince County since your elevation to the Supreme Court Bench of this Province, the Bar of Prince County desires to extend to you their congratulations and good wishes. You have enjoyed a large law practice in the City of Charlottetown for many years and for some time occupied the position of magistrate for Prince Edward Island and in later years occupied the same position for Queen's County which experience will serve you in good stead in your present judicial capacity. We welcome you to Prince County and we look forward to many years of pleasant associations with Your Lordship in the carrying out of the duties of your high position."
Mr. J. S. DesRoches, K.C., also congratulated His Lordship on his appointment to the Bench and wished him many years of useful service.

al boards as the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board, Dr. Warren said.

Prior to the formation of the federation he continued, the three major sections of the Baptist Church in Canada, the Baptist central and Western sections, had been as distinct as different denominations.
Through the co-ordinating efforts of the federation, Baptists in Canada had begun to think of themselves as unit from coast to coast, he said. This had resulted in less sectionalism and provincialism. Baptists were beginning to look at national, international, social and denominational issues with one viewpoint—a national viewpoint.
"I foresee the day when we will have more national boards," Dr. Warren declared. "Then we will become a union, not a federation. That is not practical ecclesiastical politics at the present time, but it is an ideal toward which we can work."

Our operations of registered egg grading stations in Prince Edward Island report a decrease in egg receipts last week, but production is holding up well for the season, it was reported yesterday in the Dominion Department of Agriculture egg and poultry market report.
Quality was reported to be decreasing steadily due to flocks running at large. In some areas quality had decreased as much as forty per cent.
Four carlots were inspected for shipment during the past week, one for the Special Products Board and the remainder for Maritime points.
Prices are unchanged. P. E. I. grading stations are quoting for ungraded eggs delivered: A Large 32½-33; A Medium 30½-31; B 28½-29½; C 18-21.
Graded shipments delivered Charlottetown A Large 37½; A Medium 35½; B 30; C 23.
Specialized producers are receiving for cartoned pack: A Large 40-1; A Medium 38-39.
Poultry receipts are very light. Consumer demand is light and stock is being boxed for export.
