It is difficult to understand the attitude of some of the Summerside Councillors toward Officer Henderson who, by the aid of the Mayor's casting vote, appears to have been punished while his trial is not yet complete. Why the matter did not come before the police committee, and why the testimony so far heard was not taken under oath are also matters for thought. The persons who gave the information appear not to be of sufficient weight to carry conviction against the denial of Mr. Henderson which denial appears to cover any important matters in the charges made. Mr. Henderson was a good and efficient prosecutor in Charlottetown years ago, and what looks like unfair treatment now extended to him can hardly be in accord with the wishes of those who elected the present Council in Summerside.

LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

Saturday, June 2.

House met at 11.30.
Mr. Henry J. Pineau asked the Commissioner of Public Works whether he had received a petition from the inhabitants of Mill River and vicinity, praying for the opening of a road from Albert Guards, Mill River, to Charles McMillan's, Western Road, Lot 5.

Hon. Jas. R. McLean said the road was partly opened some time ago. The work would be proceeded with during present Summer.
Mr. A. A. McLean asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to construct a Bridge on the road known as Seconcer, or Stewart Road, Lot 43 (leading from Lot 48 Road to Mount Herbert) and if so whether tenders have been called for or whether materials have been purchased for its construction, if so from whom, and to what amount; also whether the said road is a public road and what is its width.

Hon. Jas. R. McLean stated that the contract had been given to John M. Jenkins for \$88.00. The width of the road would be increased.

Mr. A. A. McLean asked the Commissioner of Public Works the name of the person or persons from whom the stone now heaped at the north end of the Provincial Building was purchased, the price paid for same and the purpose for which the same was purchased and when purchased.

Hon. Commissioner of Public Works said the stone was purchased from Mr. Purd for the purpose of building up the outside of the building where vaults were placed.

Hon. Mr. Rogers moved the House into committee with Mr. McWilliams in the chair on the bill to further amend an act to consolidate and amend the several acts incorporating the act of Charlotte town. Mr. Rogers said the Mayor and Council had been petitioned to have this bill passed. Its provisions are as follows:

1. It shall be lawful for the Council of the City of Charlottetown by a by-law or by-laws duly enacted to restrain, regulate and license any person, not being a resident or rate-payer of this province who shall use any art, trade, mystery or occupation or carry on or engage in any professional or mercantile or other business or employment (excepting Commercial Travellers) in the said City of Charlottetown and to impose by such by-laws such fines and such imprisonment with or without hard labour as the said Council may deem proper for enforcing the same.

2. The term "Commercial Traveller" mentioned in the preceding section shall be construed to mean a person who offers for sale, sells or takes orders for any kind or description of goods, wares or merchandise either by sample or otherwise to or from any person, firm or incorporated company when such person, firm or incorporated company buys or gives orders for such goods, wares or merchandise with the intention of selling the same again to some other person or persons.

The bill was discussed by Messrs. Rogers, Shaw, A. A. McLean, Peters, McLaughlin. It was held to be unfair to the people of this city who pay taxes that the foreigners should come in here and sell goods for a week or two and then leave without paying any taxes. After further discussion progress was reported.

On motion of Hon Mr. Farquharson the House went Committee with Mr. Reid in the chair on the bill to regulate the time of opening and closing public offices in Charlottetown. The bill provides that the Office of the Prothonotary and Clerk of the Crown of this Island the Offices of the Surrogate and Judge of Probate of this Island, and of the Registrar of Deeds and Keeper of Plans in Charlottetown and Summerside and all other Public Offices under the direction of the Government of this Province shall be opened at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon of each day and shall remain and continue open for the transaction of business therein from that hour until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of each day. Provided that from the Fifteenth day of May to the Thirty-first day of October in each year the said offices shall close on Saturday at the hour of one o'clock in the afternoon.

Mr. Shaw thought the hour should be from 9 to 6.
Mr. Peters disagreed with Mr. Shaw and thought the officials could not stand such hours. The hours under this provision are an hour earlier than in other places. He thought the hours in the bill sufficient long.

Hon. Mr. Sinclair thought 9 to 4 o'clock proper hours. Half an hour should be allowed at noon.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson—in regard to Mr. Shaw's statement said that the Opposition had called for the bill said he had never heard the call and besides why did not these hon. gentlemen put such an Act into force when they were in power. They would like to make hours longer because Liberals happened to occupy the offices. He thought the hours in the Bill proper and would place all the officials on an equality. An hour intermission for dinner should be allowed.

Mr. A. A. McLean was in favor of opening at 9 but thought 4 was too early for closing especially from November till March. In these months the closing hour should be 6.

Hon. Mr. McLean—Contended close application and long hours would break down the health of the officials. He often had to work long after hours. He was in favor of the 9 opening and 4 closing. Nearly every official now has to work after hours.
Hon. Mr. Gordon thought the officials evidenced no appearance of over work whose "Fair fat belly with good capin lined" indicated easy times. From 9 to 5 would be proper hours.

Mr. Shaw moved, seconded by Mr. McLean an amendment that the offices be kept open from 9 to 5 except from Nov. to March then the hours be from 9 to 6.

Hon. Mr. McLaughlin thought the Opposition were going too far. He did not believe the people would suffer any inconvenience if offices closed at 4.

The bill was further discussed by Messrs. A. J. McDonald, McKinnon after which the amendment was put and lost, 14 to 10 the bill was reported agreed to on same division.
House adjourned till 8 o'clock Monday evening.
