Hiding Place Of \$600,000 Shown

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—A cache where \$600,000 has lain hidden ever since the Roundout mail robbery was pointed out to postal inspectors as they dashed past it in an automobile today. Federal men will raid the place. The cache is in a house on the south side, it was learned. Somewhere in the house are two trunks containing \$600,000 worth of securities stolen from the mail train, according to the Newton brothers, who were members of the gang. Through the Newtons and Brent Glascock, leader of the gang, the Government has, in the course of the last fortnight, recovered \$1,400,000 worth of plunder, according to newspaper rumors at the federal building. The five robbers, all seeking clemency, have cold where the stuff was hidden after the hold-up, and all but \$600,000 worth has been recovered.

To find the missing \$600,000 worth the Newtons and Glascock were taken out of jail today and placed in an automobile guarded by police inspectors and deputy marshals.

Guided by the robbers, the inspectors drove to a south side street. In order not to arouse suspicion, they went past the hiding place without slackening speed, but the Newtons pointed out the building and the number was noted.

The trunks in which the plunder is hidden were checked at the Union Station shortly after the robbery, it is said, and later were delivered at the south side house.

Reports that more than \$1,000,000 of the \$2,000,000 Roundout mail robbery had been recovered and that the confessions of six of the defendants who pleaded guilty are "complete in every way," failed to shake the three remaining on trial today.

William Fabey, former mail inspector, accused of being the inside man in the robbery, vigorously denied reports that he also would change his plea to guilty and repeated his charges that the case against him was a frame-up.

Annual Meeting Of Children's Aid Society

Much more interest than heretofore ought to be taken in the Annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society to be held in the City Council Chamber tomorrow evening. As a result of the decision arrived at by the annual meeting of last year, the Society now functions over the whole of Queen's and King's Counties—not only over Charlottetown and Royalty. By the efforts of Tom McMillan, President of the Society, W. Henry Smith, Superintendent of Neglected and Dependent Children, the Honorary Solicitor of the Society, Mr. Donald McKinnon, and others, committee men resident throughout the county have been appointed to increase the number of Neglected and Dependent Children in every part of these counties may now be looked after by the Society's Agent and such action taken as the circumstances may require.

By the payment of the additional grant of the Legislature in 1923, the Children's Aid Society of Prince County has also been enabled to function—so that the whole of Prince Edward Island is now subject to the laws respecting children. Fortunately there are but few neglected dependent children within the limits of this island. P. E. Island parents are able, with very few exceptions to perform the duties they owe to their children. But there has lately been an increase in the number of young children towards petty thieving and other acts of delinquency. This tendency must be checked. The parents, the churches and society at large have a duty to perform in this regard. For the latter, the Children's Aid Society, through the Legislature ought to take more effective action than has been taken in recent years. This matter is one that may well be discussed at the meeting to be held tomorrow evening. The efforts of the Society to procure the establishment in this Province of a Reform School or schools have, so far, failed for want of public support.

Anderson, George Crues, Nova Scotia, Hon. E. L. Kelly, Alex MacGregor, P. E. I., W. A. Stewart, B. L. Holman, New Brunswick representatives to be appointed later.

TORONTO, Nov. 17.—When the National Liberal Conservative convention assembled after luncheon this afternoon, Chairman J. R. MacNicol read a memorandum drawn up during the recess by a special committee dealing with the proposal to form a national Association and the conference resolved itself into open debate.

The memorandum read as follows: Moved by Dr. Anderson (Saskatchewan, seconded by Mrs. Winnett London, Ont., "That this conference create a Liberal Conservative Association of Canada."

Moved by Major Taylor, Manitoba; seconded by Hon. Rodolph Monty (Quebec, "That Right Hon. Arthur Meighen be Honorary President of such an association."

Moved by Earl Lawson, Ontario, seconded by Mr. Monty, "That the Liberal Conservative Association of Canada consist of the president, five vice presidents, two of whom shall be women, a secretary and assistant secretary, a treasurer, all to be selected by this conference, and 21 males and 21 female representatives from the nine provinces to be selected by the Central Conservative Association, now existing in each province. The Provincials are to be represented as follows, Ontario—four male and four female, Quebec—three male and three female, British Columbia, two male and two female, Alberta, two male and two female; Saskatchewan, two male and two female; Manitoba, two male and two female; Nova Scotia, two male and two female; Prince Edward Island, two male and two female."
