Boothroyd, spoke effectively on the extent of the Drink evil, supporting the contention that Alcohol is harmful to the human body by many scientific facts and figures. An interesting meeting was held in the afternoon in York Church as the Women's Christian Temperance Union and the Sunday School Leaders joined in presenting to parents and others the advantages of a special course of temperance instruction. The meeting was presided over by Mrs. Milton Vessey, while Mr. Arthur Vessey acted as organist and accompanied the vocal solo given by Miss Mary Vessey. Mrs. Peter Brodie and Miss Eliza Vessey spoke of W.C.T.U. work and the plans being made for local awards in connection with the Scientific Temperance Contest. On November 10 at 3 p. m. at Kensington United Church and at 8 p. m. in Trinity United Church, Charlottetown.
