ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

WHAT will be probably the first coal of the season to arrive here is a train by the Cacouna on Thursday next to P. & C. See ad to ad.

THE Charlottetown Hospital wishes to acknowledge the sum of \$10.25, the proceeds of the Temperance debate, which was handed over by A. J. P. Me list.

The floats of the Hillsboro Ferry are expected to be in position today and horses can then be taken over without difficulty. The Blinn commenced her work on the Foxy Point ferry and will make trips when the ice permits. At present the West River ice is still fast and till it moves there will be some trouble at times. The strong winds of Sunday cleared out the North River.

H. J. McKENZIE, engineer in charge of the Relief and Murray Har or Railway, announces that part of the upper structure of the bridge is expected from Miramichi soon after opening of navigation, the swing and draw tarrvels etc. The four remaining piers and abutment are expected to be finished by August 1st, and the bridge completed before winter. Rail laying, etc., will be so pushed by Mr. Kitchen whenever the weather becomes favorable.

THE popular steamship St. Croix of the Eastern Steamship Company is now making her regular trips from St. John to Boston, leaving on Wednesday at 8 a. m., calling at Eastport and Portland, and on Saturday at 6.30 p. m. for Boston direct. Passengers arriving in St. John evening previous to Wednesday's sailing, may go on board at secure staterooms or cabin berths. The popular representative of the Company is now in the city.

THE monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The Teachers report showed the enrollment for the past month to be 1311, the average attendance 1185, per centage 88, number of cases of tardiness 245, truants 2, visits 182, notices 55, cases of corporal punishment 5, below average in grading 66, requests to leave school during the session 209. A letter was read from Prof. J. W. Robertson, stating that he was obliged to the Board for deciding to continue Manual Training, and for their all too kind expressions of appreciation for the service he was able to render them, and the boys in the school by helping to bring about the introduction of that branch of education. After some desultory discussion regarding increased accommodation and ventilation in our schools the meeting adjourned.

IN FAVOR OF PROVISIONAL LAW

SIR.—Your editorial in The Guardian of April 1st, entitled "A Doubtful Proposition," and bearing on the resolution of the All-ages favoring the substitution of the Prohibition Law for the Scott Act throughout the Province is not calculated to imbue the public mind with that confidence in the Prohibition Law which is actually its merits would seem to justify. The Scott Act is a good law in the absence of a better one but the record of its enforcement as you have recently so clearly set before your readers is not by any means creditable to the staff of officers entrusted with its enforcement. There is nothing so disastrous to the progress of temperance work as a good law poorly enforced.

Calculating from the medium of \$335.85 collected in Scott Act fines for the whole of the past year throughout the three counties, omitting Charlottetown, the liquor sellers are having things pretty much their own way. On the other hand, under the Prohibition Law in Charlottetown one liquor seller has paid perhaps ten times over that amount. In the past three months the collections under the Prohibition Law have averaged in the vicinity of \$500 a month. This speaks volumes for the efficacy and efficiency of the law and the Prosecutor as well.

Without the assistance of the county Charlottetown would not yet have its Prohibition Law which was introduced with the intention of having its operation cover the whole Province. Should the counties refuse to avail themselves of its provisions it might reasonably be taken by the Government as evidence of their want of sympathy with it and possibly form a basis for a referendum No. 3.

The electors being required to say yes or no to the question "are you in favor of a Prohibition Law (in preference to the Scott Act) with the usual two to one in favor of the saloon, the Prohibition Law would be buried deep and Charlottetown would be compelled to return to license again. These are certainly pessimistic observations but while it is always prudent to move cautiously it is nevertheless true that there are times when delays are dangerous.
