SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 5.—(CP)—Christmas tree buyers estimated today that the number of trees to be exported from Brunswick this season would exceed last year's shipments by about 25 per cent. One reason given for the expected increase was the return of experienced cutters following service with the armed forces.

KENTVILLE, N. S., Nov. 5.—A New York buyer, W. B. Clark, has predicted here that one million Christmas trees will be exported from this Province to the United States before the middle of December. Shipping of 500 carloads will start Nov. 25 and it is expected that producers will be paid a half-million dollars.
