**British Arms Reduction Plan**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17—(C. P.)—This is the Arms Reduction Plan of Sir John Simon, British Foreign Minister, which was rejected by Germany.

Four-year preliminary period during which European armies would be put on a militia basis and an international supervision of armaments set up to insure faithful discharge of agreements.

Second four-year period to bring about equality by gradual armament reduction on the part of the heavily armed powers and by permitting Germany to have arms finally allowed other powers.

**GIRL GUIDE NEWS**

The first Charlottetown Girl Guides held their weekly meeting on Monday which took the form of a get-together supper and much enjoyed by the members.

Miss Olive Thornton, Company Leader, led the Company drill and the Girls participated in real earnest and received a great deal of good from the exercises.

Games added to the attraction of the program and after a jolly half-hour the meeting closed with Auld Lang Syne and Taps.

The Girls are looking forward to a visit from Miss McMahon, Field Secretary, the last week in October.

**Using Up The Odds and Ends**

TORONTO, Oct. 16—A Scottish soldier's kilt is being made into girls' skirts, men's trousers are being cut down to boys' sizes, travellers' supplies are being patched to quilts, and woollen hats are unravelled and knitted again into tiny sweaters or dresses as scores of workers in the clothing centre of the Neighborhood Workers' Association, prepare for the coming winter in Toronto and district.

There is urgent demand for underwear and footwear, declared Miss A. Rogers, director of the clothing centre, in pointing out that 122,699 articles have been distributed among Toronto's needy in a year.

"About 70 families a day are being provided with clothing and footwear," said Miss Rogers. "Families are appealing for aid who never before approached us. Family heads have started gathering here before nine o'clock in the morning, waiting till late afternoon while we make up garments or repair shoes for them. Forty workers are cutting garments and sewing them all day, and three men repair the shoes that have been donated. As many as 77 pairs of boots and shoes have been repaired and distributed in a day."

These workers will later be augmented by 80 volunteers from groups of women of all denominations. Clothing, bedding, footwear, dishes and furniture come from churches, service clubs, women's organizations and hotels, the latter turning over important donations of clothing that has been left behind by guests who could not be located by the management within a specific period.

**SCORES CITY'S PETTY DEFENCE**

TORONTO, Oct. 16—In awarding Mrs. May Irving judgment for \$500 and costs in a damage action following her trapping over defective sidewalk, Chief H. E. Rose, in Supreme Court, said personally, as a ratepayer in Toronto, he was humiliated that on his behalf the city should set up such a defence. "The city should be ashamed to raise such a petty defence," said the Chief Justice.

His Lordship stated that the injuries were caused by the failure of the city to perform its statutory duties in respect to highways and the plaintiff did not show any negligence to cause the accident. The defence claimed the service of notice had not been made according to statutes and pointed out that a letter had been written by plaintiff's husband, setting forth the details of the accident, which ended "awaiting your reply". This, he held, was sufficient notice.

**Back To The Land Movement Is Evident**

SARNIA, Ont., Oct. 17—(C. P.)—Success of a Sarnia family in the Ontario back to the land scheme is reported in a letter from Rev. W. B. Williston, of Cochrane, to Rev. E. W. McKegney, of this city. The family is located 10 miles south of Cochrane, in one of the best communities of northern Ontario. The letter says:

"The family has a fine lot. The house was built by the new settler and although he did not have experience in this work he made an excellent job. They have a cow and 24 hens and have grown enough vegetables for winter use. The land around is gradually being cleared and in about a year they will be an independent family and, in my opinion, one of the best in the community."

**Scout News and Notices**

**THE SWASTIKA NOT "PURE GERMAN"**

Not the least of the inconsistencies of the fervid Nazi super-nationalism that would cast out of Germany all that is not "pure Germanic" in origin is the "Swastika" emblem, adopted as the symbol of Teutonic purity and superiority. For the Swastika—the cross with the left-turn arms—is probably the oldest symbol of which there is historic record.

Long before the time of Christ it was used by the Chinese, the Greeks, the Hindus and the Arabs of northern Africa. It also was used in pottery designs by North American Indians.

The word "Swastika" is ancient Sanskrit, and means "Be well!" or "Good luck!"

In Canada the badge has been used for many years by the Boy Scouts as a "Thanks Badge," for presenting to those who have rendered Scouts some important service.

Following disturbances in Toronto resulting from the carrying of the Nazi emblem by demonstrators, the question was raised as to whether the wearing of the Scout Swastika should be continued. Dominion Scout Headquarters takes the position that the badge should not be taken down by those entitled to wear it, but that in case of questioning, the significance of the "Thanks Badge" should be explained, particularly the superimposed miniature Scout Badge—the "True North" points and the two small five-point stars representing the 10 Scout Laws.

**"BADEN-POWELL" ROAD**

During the summer's "goodwill cruise" visit of British Scout and Guide leaders to Palanga, Lithuania, Lord Baden-Powell opened a new road named after him. Two thousand Lithuanian Scouts and Guides had gathered for the occasion.

A torchlight procession through the streets of Reval to the stadium and a great camp-fire was the Esthonian welcome extended Lord and Lady B. P. and British Scout and Guide leaders during a goodwill summer cruise round the Baltic ports.

**A NEW ORDER FOR BADEN-POWELL**

The Order of the Three Stars of Latvia was conferred upon Lord Baden-Powell by the President of the Republic during the summer's visit to Rega of the S.S. Calgarie on a Scout and Guide "goodwill cruise" of Baltic ports.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 16—(C. P.)—Commercially, the oulachon is not among the more important of Canada's many food fishes, although it is a choice pan-fish and finds ready sale when on the market. It is valued by the Indians of British Columbia since to them it is not only a food in itself, as well as a source of a fat which may be used in place of lard or butter, but it may also do duty as a candle.

The oulachon may reach a length of 10 inches or a foot and it carries a long scientific name—Thaleichthys pacificus.

**Reaffirm Resolutions**

MONCTON, N.B., Oct. 17—Resolutions passed at a previous meeting of the Provincial Council of Women of New Brunswick were reaffirmed here Saturday at the annual meeting of that body. They urged the proclamation of the Children's Protection Act, which had been passed by the Legislature some time ago and the putting into effect a provincial election ballot in uniformity with that used in federal contests.

**United Church To Aid Needy**

WINNIPEG, Oct. 16—As a result of decisions reached at the recent meeting of the presbyteries, the United Church of Canada in Manitoba will again devote itself energetically to the securing and distribution of relief in the drought region in the southwest section of the province. To the extent that it is required, assistance from the east has already been promised. In addition to vegetables and food of various kinds a large amount of clothing is expected to be sent out this year.

Winnipeg will participate in the effort. Gifts of clothing particularly will be sought from the city congregations. A careful check-up has already been made by the church authorities in the southwestern portion of the province and it has been ascertained that a large quantity of clothing will be required by the stricken homes in this territory during the coming winter. The supplies in this connection will have to come largely from Winnipeg, since it is already known that the towns and villages will only be able to look after their own communities this winter.

The United Church has again set up its National Relief committee, through which medium donations will be received from the whole church, throughout Canada, Rev. R. B. Cochrane, secretary of the Home Missions Board is chairman of this body.

**Fifty Million Made Raising Vegetables**

LONDON, Oct. 16—(C. P.)—In the towns and villages of England and Wales there are more than 1,000,000 allotment holders producing, it has been estimated, \$50,000,000 worth of vegetables and fruits every year on their small plots provided for them by the municipalities. Probably half these men are otherwise unemployed, says the News-Chronicle, which set out to ascertain how many of these men had the requisite knowledge to win the richest yield from their land.

At Avoncroft College for rural workers the Birmingham Citizens' Society arranged for the attendance of 100 men of all sorts for four weeks of training. Those who took advantage of the proposition included commercial travellers, blacksmiths, farmacemen, toolmakers, stockers, insurance agents, bricklayers, tailors, riveters and tube testers.

The scheme was an undoubted success. Not only have they become better cultivators but they can, in some degree, teach their neighbors at home.

James Dudley, the principal said: "I am surprised at the men's keenness—they ask questions by the score—and I am absolutely convinced of the tremendous value of the allotments schemes, both to the country and in saving the men themselves mentally and physically. If the government does nothing more, it should see that the unemployed have their allotments."

Remembering Lloyd George's plea for putting 500,000 more men on the land, the reporter asked several of the "students" how they would like to earn a livelihood in that way.

Some said they would gladly leave factories for the land, others that they would not unless the wages were far higher; others again said, "I would if I were my own boss and got the benefit of what I did," and others again asked: "How could we make a living if those on the land now can't?" These last had talked with a grower who said he was getting nippence a pot for fruit it had cost him 10 pence to pick.

But the love of the land and hard work is there the reporter declared.

**Brotherhood Organizer Dead**

SYDNEY, N.S., Oct. 17—(C. P.)—William J. McPherson of Toronto, General Organizer of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, died here today in his 63rd year. He had been ill more than a year.

A native of Picton, N. S., he was one of the charter members of the Canadian Brotherhood when it was formed in 1908. While employed here in the railway police service, he organized the first Sydney unit. Later, he was transferred to Toronto as general organizer.
