The lowest prices of the sales season were realized for the others, the top selling price being \$4,000, which was paid for a colt by Zeus Edna Collins by the Fernbrook Stables. W. J. Salmon paid \$3,700 for a dark chestnut or brown colt by Jack Atkins-Frances. Eastern breeders took advantage of conditions and made numerous purchases of yearling fillies which are destined to become brood mares. The 40 head sold realized \$43,950, an average of \$1,098.75.

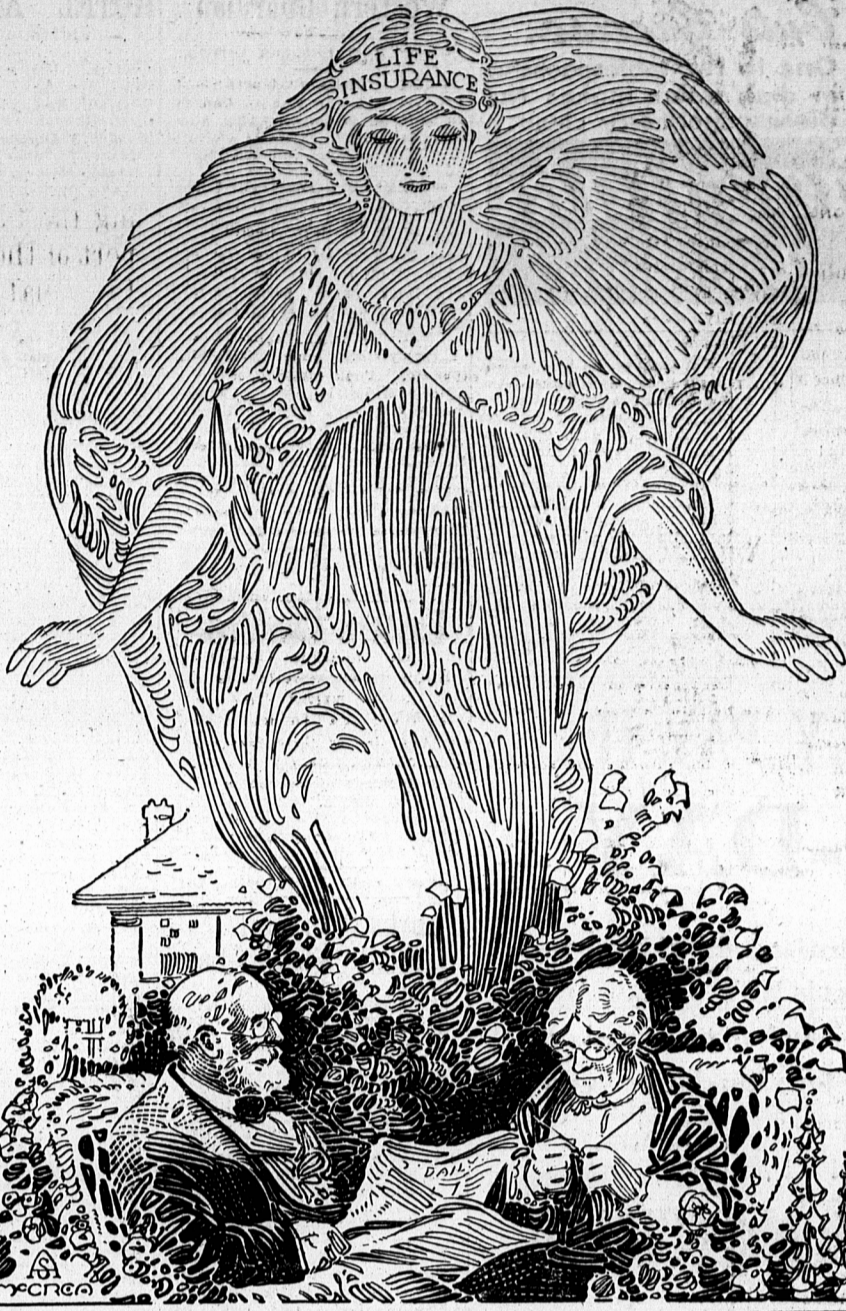

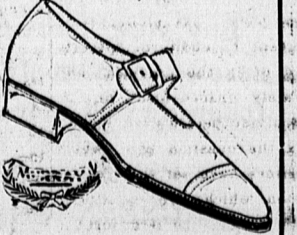
Duties Will Harm Canada's Cattlemen

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—Believing they will be greatly harmed by the emergency tariff law duties on cattle and the cattle duties proposed in the new tariff bill, Western Canadian cattle growers have sent individual letters to more than 30,000 United States farmers, urging a change in the rates. The Canadian cattle-men have also appealed to the Senate Finance Committee, House Ways and Means Committee and individual members of both Houses of Congress. The Canadian cattlemen seek to show that the high rates do not benefit United States farmers, and actually hurt them by shutting off from the United States desirable "feeder" cattle, which could be fattened in the United States to the advantage of the farmers of this country. Further, the Canadian cattlemen point out that the high rates exist and proposed are hurting trade between the United States and Canada.
