### HORSEMEN'S ASSOCIATION

The annual meeting of The Prince Edward Island Horsemens' Association, was held at the office of The Canada Fox Exchange Charlottetown, on March 20th at 8 p. m.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read by the secretary and adopted and read.

The President Mr. D. A. MacKinnon then read the following report:—  
Charlottetown, P. E. I.,  
March 18, 1915.

Members of the P. E. Island Horsemens' Association,  
Charlottetown.

Gentlemen:—  
Another year has been added to the life of our Association and I am pleased to welcome you to the meeting to-night and pleased to inform you that our Association is in healthy condition. Our finances are good, the calls which have been made upon them having been very slight.

Our Association has justified its existence in various ways. Since its organization the Executive have been called upon to deal with various matters concerning horse racing. These matters have been handled in the most judicious manner, reflecting credit on the Executive for their judgment and skill.

One of these matters was the freight rates on railways. The committee was appointed last June with Mr. P. S. Brown as chairman. This committee waited on the I. C. R. Management and from them secured free return rate for horses attending exhibitions and regular race meetings, also concessions in fares for horsemen, their attendants and trainers. This one thing alone would have justified the existence of this Association. The matter had been agitated for years by individual horsemen throughout the Maritime Provinces and a tangible result had been achieved until the committee referred to above took the matter in hand.

The Association has also made itself felt in dealing with some smaller matters pertaining to racing in connection with the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition and our own local Exhibition. The President of the Charlottetown Driving Park is also the honorary President of the P. E. Island Horsemens' Association. A committee of the Horsemens' Association waited on Mr. Hertz last spring and suggested that larger purses and an extra day's meeting be given in connection with our Exhibition. Mr. Hertz looked into the matter and became convinced that it was feasible. The result was that three days' racing was given with purses of \$350.00 each.

The foreign horsemen came here and were greatly pleased with the treatment accorded them. The public turned out in large numbers to see the races, new track records were made and everybody was satisfied. The thanks of the Association should be given to Mr. Hertz who is its warm friend and whom we hope will continue to remain the President of the Charlottetown Driving Park.

While there is no doubt that considerable more activity could be displayed by us as an Association along various lines and horse racing be made even more popular as a means of recreating to the public, still it must be remembered that the present season has a larger amount of racing than ever before in local tracks, and the past winter was the greatest ever for ice racing. In almost every hamlet in the Province ice races were being held attended by hundreds and even thousands of spectators, all keenly interested in the good old sport. It should be the aim of every member and every horse owner to popularize the sport as much as possible by sending any news of interest in connection with horse races or horses to the public papers. The idea is to get the public interested in the game and the result of the news.

The war has adversely affected all sport and will continue to do so. Owing to Halifax being a garrison city and there being considerable military activity there last fall, it was not thought wise to hold the Exhibition—although there is no doubt that it could have been held and would have been successful. The result was that the horse racing program was cut down to four days. This year, no doubt, the sport will be somewhat quieter in Nova Scotia, but I see no good reason why the same activity as usual should not prevail here. In Russia, Austria, France and the United States horse races are being held as usual and those who are here and in the game should endeavor as far as possible to keep it alive—as it is very much harder to revive a sport after it has declined than to keep it up to concert pitch after it has attained a healthy condition.

It should be the aim of members of the Association to get as many other interested as possible. With that end in view I would respectfully suggest that a series of Matinee races be arranged for Monday afternoons during the summer months. A small admission fee could be charged at the gate and small prizes, such as ribbons, blankets, boots, or something of that kind could be given. These would be excellent workouts for the horses. The marks made in Matinee racing do not constitute a record, so that the sport would become popular, horsemen would have their horses in campaigning condition and new men would, no doubt, become interested in the Matinee racing, purchase horses for the sport and thus add to the general interest.

In conclusion, I would ask you, as much as possible to work together. It is a noteworthy fact that the horsemen here have had the least friction among them of any that we know of. This policy of friendship and good will should be continued.

I cannot close without thanking you for the honor you have conferred upon me in electing me president for the past two terms. During the com-

ing season I will follow with a great deal of interest the program of sport in this Province and hope that you, one and all, will have every success, and even if you are not all winners you will, I am sure, derive a great deal of pleasure from the sport.

The Secretary, Mr. T. C. Edgett, reported the association and its finances to be in a healthy condition.

Considerable discussion took place in regard to holding matinee races on the Charlottetown Driving Park the coming season on Monday afternoons, special prizes to be given for same instead of purses in order not to give the horses a mark too early in the season; Mr. D. A. MacKinnon presented the association with a purse of money to be used for matinee purposes.

The following officers were elected for 1915:—Honary president, Mr. F. R. Hertz; president, D. A. MacKinnon; Vice-President, Mr. J. S. Wedlock; Secretary, Mr. T. C. Edgett; Treasurer, Mr. Hammond Kelly. The directors for Prince, Kings and Queen's counties the same as last year.

A committee of five were appointed as a "speed committee" to arrange all matters pertaining to races, classes, etc., composed of the following gentlemen: Messrs P. S. Brown, J. S. Wedlock, H. H. Horne, H. Kelly, T. C. Edgett, Mr. F. R. Newsome was appointed as press correspondent.

It was decided to recommend the following classes to The Charlottetown Driving Park Association for the 3rd race, viz 2.16 class trot and pace mile heat, 2.24 trot, and 2.30 trot and pace. A vote of thanks was tendered to the President and secretary for their work during the past year, also to the president D.A. MacKinnon for his generous donation towards the encouragement of matinee racing, the meeting then adjourned.

### HUGE COST MAY TERMINATE WAR

LONDON, March 17.—Edgar Crammond, a prominent financial writer, read a paper before the Royal Statistical Society here dealing with the cost of the war. In his opinion the war must end in July through the exhaustion of some of the belligerents. Mr. Crammond estimates the total cost of the war to the end of July as \$16,990,000,000, and the total economic loss, through damage to property and other direct and indirect losses, at \$45,740,000,000. He estimates that Great Britain alone will spend up to the end of July £708,000,000.
