It appears that on the night of October 21, a Turkish force under the command of Mahmud Mutahar Pasha and Prince Aziz Pasha went out with the intention of making a surprise attack on the Bulgarian army, converging on Kirk-Kiliseh.

Ninety per cent. of the Sunday School problems are problems of the general work and are not denominational. The weakness of the work is in the department. Teacher training and temperance show advance. Ten of the fifteen districts have sent in full statistical reports.

The report of the executive committee was presented by Rev. E. S. Weeks. This report noted the excellent work of Secretary Ross, the passing of Rev. R. G. Strathie, the work of Mrs. Sanderson as Superintendent of elementary work and the specially good report of South King's District. It noted also an improved condition in finances.

The Treasurer, S. M. Hicks, reported total amount received during the year \$791. The debts carried over from last year had been reduced \$100. The present liabilities \$125, cash on hand \$65. It is hoped to pay off all debts by the close of the convention and start the new year with a clean sheet all round.

Mrs. Bryner spoke again on planning the Sunday School program. No program run itself. The plan should embrace four features—these are worship, fellowship, instruction and business. Worship includes singing, scripture, prayer and offering; fellowship includes registration of addition to cradle roll, first day observances, new pupils and greetings to strangers and visitors; instruction includes the lesson for the day, memory lesson, development of hymn and song and hand-work; business includes recording of records and reports, credit and recognition, announcements and distribution of literature. There should be plan, purpose, proportion and promptness.

The subject for consideration on Wednesday afternoon was the work of the secondary division; this covered the ten years. General Secretary Ross spoke on, Why the Secondary Division is needed. Because it is the weak point of Sunday School work. This is the period of greatest possibility and of greatest peril. Hence we should fortify our work there.

Secretary Reilly, of the Y.M.C.A., Charlottetown, spoke on Organization for Boys. Mr. Reilly said boys love organization. There are more than one hundred different recognized organizations for boys of the teen age. These express the social, the religious, the intellectual, and the athletic ideas. The Sunday Schools have lacked virility, male teachers, lessons adapted to boys, and have failed to recognize the boy's instinct for leadership. He would organize a boys' department in the Sunday School, train older boys to lead younger boys and train boys along lines of many services.

Mrs. Bryner spoke of Girl Problem as palliating the problem of boys of similar age. She said that of nineteen women prominent in Sunday School work in the United States and Canada, nineteen began to work in their Sunday Schools between the ages of thirteen and nineteen. Though class in the secondary division, should be a group and should have a name, a motto and a committee on membership and on mission. The membership committee should have charge of all matters touching the members of the class.

General Secretary Ross spoke on missions in the secondary division. All the New Testament books were written by missionaries. Boys love stories of the men who can do things. The Bible abounds in these, so do the pages of missionary literature. Use them.

Rev. Geo. M. Young then read a conference on church work for the teen years pupils. Mr. Young said that when he was a boy there was no adolescence and no teen age. With advance in complexity of life comes the demand for more specialized effort. This is the set of the soul that determines the destiny of the boy or girl. Between the ages of twelve and sixteen the average boy falls into the hands of the police or of the pastor. Boys and girls need sympathy and guidance. The teen age is a very lonely period of flight. Get next to the boy or girl. The boy's great question is "Why?" They should have the right answer at that time. Three things are necessary—a leader.

TWO MEN RESCUED AS SCHOONER SINKS. PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Oct. 28—Captain Thomas Murray and Frank Williams were rescued from the schooner Myra Sears early today when the craft struck on Sister Ledge off Whalesback Light, by Captain Hall and the crew of the Wood Island Life-saving Station. The craft, half full of water, was towed into Kitteryport by the station motor boat, Rumors say she is to be sent to some and sank when 500 feet from shore. The case filed through a "nearest friend" alleges that the husband failed to support her. The charges, however, are admitted by the mother of the bride to be merely steps at "annul" the marriage.

"I don't know why I married Gustave," the young bride said. "I thought he would 'back out' at the last moment and he thought I would. I didn't care for him; don't now and I want to have my marriage annulled."

"It was just like that," she said with a wave of her hand and a smile. "Gus and I have been friends for a long time."

The night of December 6 last he came to my home and said we might as well get married. I gave my consent. "We woke up the marriage license clerk at his home to get a license. I said I was nineteen years old. He came back home and laughed over the matter. The next day Gus came to the house and we went to Justice Krueger and were married. After the ceremony I came home and Gus went to his father and mother. We decided to keep it quiet."

PROSPEROUS DAYS ARE DISCOUNTED. LONDON, October 29—We are living in days of exceptional prosperity, was the recent declaration of Lloyd George. The chancellor of the exchequer certainly acts accordingly. To the already staggering annual cost of the insurance act he added \$2,500,000 in a speech of a few minutes when he increased his offering to an annual stipend to the doctors, who have hitherto refused to work on the terms "provided in the bill."
