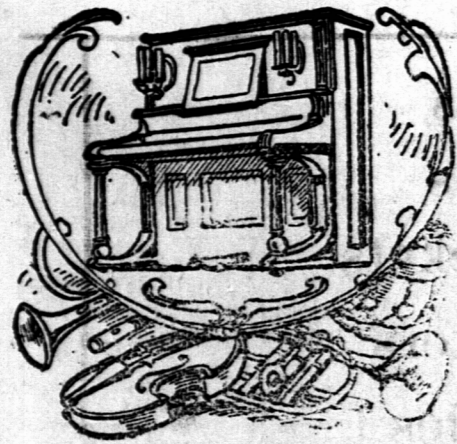

## Across the Strait.

Having been granted a breathing spell of four weeks, by the kindness of his considerate people, your correspondent, at half past nine last Monday morning, began his vacation trip, when the good steamer Princess swung out from the wharf on her daily trip to Pictou. From a landman's view there was certainly every prospect of a rough passage. Something more than a wholesale breeze was blowing from about due west, and the harbor was covered with white-caps. But we had hardly got out into the Bay before it began to calm down, and by the time we rounded Point Prim, both wind and waves had almost become a memory. Thence onward until we entered Pictou Harbor, the way proved as smooth as one is apt to see upon any salt water. In Pictou Harbor, where it could do no possible harm, we met exactly the same kind of a breeze that we had left at Charlottetown.

The Princess is certainly a splendid boat for the service in which she is engaged. She made the trip of fifty miles in exactly four hours, and although before reaching Point Prim she got the full effect of a rather vigorous chop-see, that struck her full broad side, her rolling was of the gentlest character, its only effect, so far as the writer was concerned, was to develop a most energetic appetite, whose demands could not be long resisted in the presence of anything to supply them. The welcome sound of the dinner bell did not awaken false hopes. A better dinner or better serving, is something that you would waste time in looking for. The officers and crew thoroughly understand their business, which means that among other good qualities, they know how to treat passengers so that no cause is left for reasonable complaint. The three requisites of an enjoyable sea trip, are a good ship, a good captain and crew, and a quiet sea and on the trip in question, we had them all in the highest degree. Captain A. McLean, Mate A. McLeod, Engineer Charles Cummings, assistant Engineer James Godfrey, Purser H. H. Gordon and Steward James Smith, are all men that one likes to travel with. In fact all the crew of this speedy but steady ship take a part in ministering to the comfort and convenience of all who cross the strait by this route.

A journey across Nova Scotia at this time of the year shows the fair Province at its very best. One reaches this locality beside the beautiful Medway and only five miles from the Atlantic, by 300 miles of railway travel and eighteen miles of coach. In this case the time was exactly 30 hours, including an all night wait at Windsor Junction and three hours lay-by at Middleton. Everywhere along the line one sees the scars of the recent drytime, in fields that have become sere before their time, and in many blackened extents that reveal the effects of recent fires. While it is truly said that hardly an equal extent on earth equals Nova Scotia in the richness and variety of its resources, it is also said with equal truth, that large portions of this wonderful peninsula are totally unfit for farming. But these very rocky hills and barrens contain the richest deposits of precious metal, and show, by a luxuriant growth of hardwood and pine, that the soil among the boulders is of the best character. The LaHave the Medway and other rivers have been very low. Good rains are now bringing them back to their usual level. The United States tourist is met with at all points. He has a lot to say, seems to be constantly on the move, and has lots of money, which he appears more than willing to exchange for what he considers an equivalent value. Addison E.
