so, than to aim at the accumulation of money to be handed down to posterity. The result was a stage where Hittoray has gone down to the minimum.

MARRIAGE - Respecting marriage, New Zealand, said Hon. Mr. Poole, encourages early marriages. When a States gives them advice and allows them to pick out the kind of a home they desire, the State supervises the erection of the home so desired, and sees to it that only proper building materials are utilized. For this the State asks the couple for \$50 and allows the couple twenty-five and a half years to pay the balance of cost of erection of their home. The States said the speaker, recognizes that a newly married couple need a home just as much as a pair of birds need a nest and the occupation of other people's nests was a condition generally most destructive to happiness. It was found that the people aided in the manner he had outlined, had, in the time of storms, become firm rocks for the nation.

FARMING - Respecting farming the State recommended that people live on the farm and to this end the government had large tracts of land broken up and divided into parcels which were leased for the period of ninety-nine years and as a result of this step the wilderness today blossomed like a rose and the wealth producing qualities of its people were time, and time again, fully demonstrated.

Turning to state ownership, Hon. Mr. Poole said that he was a believer in it in a modified form, as after years of study, experience and research, he had come to the conclusion that co-operation and profit sharing are to precede state ownership. Today it so existed, he said, that the difference between the producer and consumer costs were making some nations wonder where the "Nigger in the woodpile" existed. Only the rectification of this would better the future welfare of civilization.

Here Hon. Mr. Poole cited prices in different parts of the United States in comparison to prices which consumers in Canada and other portions of the United States were paying. In conclusion he pointed out many ideals which might be followed and expressed the wish that he might kindle the spark of genius in one single life for it that were accomplished it would more than pay for the energy and expense of Chautauqua. He ended his excellent address in the assurance that he bore to Canada, and to Canadians, the greetings of New Zealanders.

HALIFAX, August 2 - Fire fighters from many parts of the Maritime Provinces, gathered at Dartmouth recently, to take part in the preliminaries of the athletic meet under the auspices of the D. F. D. It was a great day for outdoor pastime and a great day for the Glace Bay and Charlottetown firemen who figured in almost every event. This meet, held in connection with the big carnival of the Dartmouth firemen, brought together some of the most famous athletes in the Maritimes.

Glace Bay, always a great sporting town, trotted out Davy Nolan, 1921 Maritime middleweight boxing champion; Johnny Wier, captain of the famous Caledonia football team; Hec McDonald, noted all round athlete and others.

Charlottetown sent up Harry Harley, 15 years ago one of the leading all around track and field men in the Maritimes; George Walker, champion long distance bicycle rider of The Herald and Mail 45 mile bike race; Lou Campbell, sprinter, baseball and hockey player, Charlie MacDonald, welterweight boxing champion of the Maritimes was a notable with the

In Davy Nolan, the Glace Bay fireman have a sterling performer and yesterday he waded through the preliminaries in every event he started in. He won the sprints in fast time and was runner up in the barrel boxing event.

Harley, a veteran of many hard sprint events, gave another veteran, Charlie Weeks, a lesson in the century for firemen of 45 and over. Weeks dashed over the cinders like a two year old and nosed out some promising runners.

The big event of the day was the 300 yards reel race, in which nine teams started. Glace Bay negotiated the distance in 49 seconds, which proved to be too high a mark for the others to shoot at. In the final yards of their trial, the Stellarton team had the misfortune to become entangled in the hose and their rivals showed real sportsmanship in allowing them another trial, their being no dissenters at the conference in the centre of the track when the suggestion was made that the new trial be granted. Halifax was next to Glace Bay in this race, which caused great excitement in the stands.

Gormier of the Halifax team showed natural speed in the 100 yard and will bear watching in today's finals. He beat out some good men in yesterday's trials.

Conrod and Hilton, famous in the days of the tourneys at the old Dartmouth rink, lived up to their long standing reputation in the break and make up event, and won in six seconds, with Walker and Grey, Dartmouth and Irons and Weston, Halifax tied for second.
