THE MARKETS
(Canadian Press.)
MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 21.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today continued inactive owing to the fact that there was little or no demand from foreign buyers and the general opinion in the trade was that there will be little improvement during the balance of the year. The demand from local and country buyers was also limited. The market on the whole was dull with an easy undertone. Prices for oats showed a decline of 1/2 cent per bushel with car lots of Ontario and Quebec No. 2 wheat quoted at 52 1/2 cents, No. 3 white at 51 cents and No. 4 white at 49 1/2 cents per bushel ex-track. Canadian western grades were steady. Owing to the further weakness in the Canadian cash wheat situation an easier feeling developed in the spring wheat flour market here and prices were reduced 40 cents per barrel. A feature of the winter flour section was the softer tendency and prices were reduced 10 cents per barrel. Prices for all lines of millfeed were well maintained under a steady demand. A fair business was transacted in rolled oats and prices were unchanged. The market for eggs was moderately active and the tendency was steady. Butter prices were reduced one cent per pound as easier, feeling developed in
