The fifth annual convention of the Eastern Teachers' Association which opens in the Town Hall at Georgetown on Wednesday, the 26th of June, promises to be the most successful meeting in the history of that progressive association. Tickets at one first-class fare will be issued over the P. E. I. Railway on June 28th, 29th and 30th good to return up to and on July 2nd. Among the special features at this year's convention will be a steamboat excursion over the waters of Georgetown Harbor and the Brudenell, Cardigan and Montague rivers. At the public meeting on the evening of June 29th addresses will be delivered by Rev. Thos. Fullerton Dr. Anderson, Murdoch McKinnon, M.L.A. and G. S. Inman. In connection with the convention there will be an exhibit of penmanship, map-drawing and free-hand drawing collected from the schools of the inspectorate and a large exhibit of charts, pictures for schoolroom decorations etc., such as are used in the schools of England. J. P. McCloskey of the International Correspondence school will give a demonstration of the teaching of languages by phonograph.

The bride's costume was pearl silk with veil and orange blossoms. After the ceremony luncheon was served and many friends accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Johnston to the station. They boarded the train for Winnipeg, and other eastern towns amid hearty cheers and showers of rice. EASTERN NOTES.—Farmers are taking a little relaxation after the hurried labors of spring. The season has been late crowding the work into a smaller space, and hurrying farmers more than usual. Fishing has been dull the past week from stormy weather and scarcity of bit. There are plenty of fish still on the coast but nothing to put on the hooks. The fishermen who invested largely in mackerel nets have so far met with disappointing results, but something is still hoped for, as the season is early. A wire fence has been erected around the Red Point school yard, a credit to the people and the district. The trustees, with their energetic and public spirited Secretary, John McLellan, are to be commended for their enterprise in building a schoolhouse, commodious in its dimensions and modern in its arrangement with a nicely graded yard and suitable surroundings.—The road machine under the supervision of John Andrew Campbell, is doing good work here at present.
