

# EMPLOYED BOYS' STATISTICS

The following statistics tabulated from the survey recently conducted by the Rotary Club was submitted Thursday night at the Boys' Supper in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, by Mr. R. C. Sidenius:—

## EMPLOYED BOYS' STATISTICS.

### Re Educational Advantages:

We note one-third of Employed Boys never got beyond Grade 5. Another sixth stopped at Grade 6. One-third stopped at Grade 7 and 8. One-sixth, stopped at Grade 9 and 10. Two Employed Boys finished first year Prince of Wales College. Only seven boys report taking special educational work during leisure time.

### Age Starting Work:

One-tenth of boys left school to go to work before 14. Over one-quarter before 15 years of age. Nearly three-quarters left school before 16 years of age. Less than twenty per cent. stayed in school through 17th and 18th year.

### Leisure Hours—How Spent:

33 per cent. stated doing nothing, on streets, pool room, movies. 59 per cent. spent leisure time in recreation, (but answers would generally indicate the lack of any definite objective in this.) 3 per cent. working in their leisure hours. 7 studying trying to get ready for the next job higher up.

### Hours at Work:

Answers would indicate reasonable hours. 7 per cent. nine hours or less. 10 per cent. to work over ten hours.

## SCHOOL BOYS.

### Leisure

2 per cent. spent same in recreation, thorough rest, doing nothing, pool room and streets. 20 per cent. work after school hours—selling papers, messengers, store clerks. 7 per cent. are helping at home doing chores, gardening and so forth. 1 per cent. stated they studied, read and took music lessons. A few parents stated they did not know what their boys did.

175 Boys enter school each year. 68 per cent. have left school by the tenth grade. Three-fifths of the remaining 34 per cent. take a Commercial course. Two-fifths of remaining 34 per cent. enter Prince of Wales and St. Dunstan's and only 40 per cent. of these students take beyond on the first year work. Out of 175 new students entering school each year less than 7 per cent. go beyond first year college work.

60 per cent. of boys are below average in their grade according to their years. 10 per cent. are above average according to same. 30 per cent. according to age are in the grade they should be.

### Games Played:

Answers revealed that 36 per cent. do not play in such organized team games as baseball, hockey, basketball, football, cricket, etc. 30 per cent. stated they played team games. 34 per cent. play but largely individualistic games. Practically no supervised organized effort or program of athletics or team games are promoted by the Schools or City.

## BOY SURVEY GENERAL

### Clubs and Gangs:

32 per cent. stated they belonged to some boys' club, gang or organization; the three outstanding under supervision being Trail Rangers and Tuxis Boys' Program of the Churches.

### Young Men's Christian Association.

### League of the Cross.

68 per cent. were not lined up in any organized or supervised club.

### Swim:

43 per cent. of the boys can swim. 57 per cent. of the boys cannot swim.

### Living at Home or Boarding:

11 Boys whose parents are dead or for other causes had guardians. 17 Boys reported boarding; all the rest living at home.

### Sunday School:

1 out of every six Protestant boys stated they did not attend Sunday School.

4 stated they had no denominations.

### How Vacation is Spent:

Answers clearly show lack of any plan or purpose. 34 per cent. stated spent some time in the country. 57 per cent. stated played at home, played and did nothing. 9 per cent. said they worked.

### Wanted Vocational Help:

37 answered Yes to the question: "Do you wish any help in choosing a vocation?" or 11 per cent. of the answers.

## CLASSIFICATION OF OCCUPATIONS WHICH BOYS INTEND TO FOLLOW

The sad part of the answers reveal the fact that five-sixths, even the older boys, 16 to 19, sharing equally with the younger boys, with no idea as to their future vocation.
