FUNERAL YESTERDAY—The funeral of the late Mr. John Newsom took place yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock. A large number of citizens attended. Rev. Mr. Fulton conducted the services at the home, Euston Street. Interment was made in the People's Cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs Charles C. Gardner, Henry Aitken, Albert Duester, Henry Smith, Aeneas Macdonald and Colonel Moore. The funeral was under Masonic auspices. The late Mr. Newsom, who was 76 years of age, was a native of Cornwall, in this province. He received his education in the district school and later in the Prince of Wales College, then the old Central Academy. For a number of years he conducted a large cabinet-making and furniture business in Charlottetown. He had, in his busy lifetime served at least three generations in that line. He was a man of parts; besides his cabinet-making and furniture business, he also was largely interested in agriculture, formerly owning the extensive farm and property at Holland Cove, and also for many years carrying on the "Seaside Hotel" at Rustico. Mr. Newsom was justly regarded as one of the best-read men or self-educated citizens of this city and province. He was an extensive reader, a deep thinker, and on matters of history—ancient and modern—as well as upon Biblical lore, he had a wonderful and abundant knowledge. Besides all this, he took a deep interest in Botany and antiquarian subjects, being a leading member and officer of the Natural History and Antiquarian Society of this Province, and justly named one of the island's foremost naturalists. In his life he was always active in all that made for the betterment, development and advancement of this city and province. His death will be much regretted for he enjoyed a deep and intimate acquaintanceship, and was one of the landmarks in the community. He married Elizabeth Hutcheson, who, with a family of eight, survive to cherish his memory. The family are as follows: Charles, at Rocky Point; Fred and Will in Edmonton; Harry at East River; George, with the soldiers at Sarcee Camp, Calgary; Arthur in Vancouver, and Minnie and Hattie at home.

IN MEMORIAM

GEORGE H. GARDINER.

A telegram received here on Saturday brought news of the death in Boston the day before, of George H. Gardiner. Death followed a long illness. Mr. Gardiner was 85 years of age when the summons came, and had been sixty years married. He was born in Prince Edward Island and spent the greater portion of his life in this province. He thought there was no place like his island home and never wearied of sounding its praises. He was especially pleased with Summerside, and for years he spent his summers there. Everyone who knew the deceased liked him for his many good qualities of head and heart. His bereaved widow and family and other relatives will have much sympathy in their hour of sorrow.

ALEXANDER S. GILLEN

There passed away in Souris on Oct. 8, after a long and painful illness a well-known and much respected citizen, Alexander ("Sandy") Gillen, was born at Cape Rae, Newfoundland, 32 years ago last June. He was quite young when his parents came to this province. After leaving school he obtained employment on the railway and was for some time a fireman in British Columbia. Twelve years ago he was stricken with a serious and painful sickness. During a period of two years he consulted various leading physicians in Canada and U. S. A., and was for a time in the hospital at Kansas City, and also at Saratoga Springs, but without deriving any benefit. Ten years ago last August he came to Souris and ever since has been confined to his bed, perfectly helpless. During his long illness he has been carefully nursed by his mother and sister. He was buried in the Anglican Cemetery at Souris on Sunday, August 9, the service being conducted by Mr. Clement Mitchell. There remain to mourn his loss, his mother, brother William in Souris, and Charles Jacob in California, and sisters Margaret (Mrs. Roach), and Winnie in Souris, and Mrs. Shields in Halifax.

ISLANDER KILLED—Mr. Jas. A. Gillis, Victoria Cross, has been notified that his son James G. Gillis, of the King's Regiment was killed in action between 8th and 12th September. Pte. Gillis had been in Western Canada and enlisted there.

SAVING FINE TABLE LINEN.

If one has some cherished table linen and it shows decided signs of wear, a "hint to the wise is usually sufficient;" well to repair is almost invariably a work of art, and if this simple suggestion is followed the life of your cloth will be prolonged considerably.

Place it smoothly on a sewing table wrong side up; over the worn part baste neatly a piece of fine net; darn it down through the holes (of net), using fine flax thread for the purpose; remove the bastings carefully, press the cloth, and if you have proceeded as directed, you will be delighted with the result. It is supposed everyone knows that old tablecloths can be cut

up into napkins, which will last a long time when neatly hemmed; the worn parts should be kept; they are invaluable for burns, and many other purposes in case of sickness. Flax thread is obtainable from the notion counter of any good department store.

Another way of prolonging the life of a favorite cloth is to cut it carefully into fourths, first down the centre fold and then across the strips. Item the cut edges with the flat napery hem. Procure handsome torchon lace and sew along the selvage end of each piece there will be a double row of insertion down the centre and across the centre of the cloth. The crossing will make a lace square in the centre of the cloth. A separate medallion may be placed and placed in the centre or one underlying strip may be cut away and joined invisibly to the other. Any one who understands draw work or lace work will be able to join the lace strips nicely. Sew a lace border around the outer edge of the cloth.


If one is able to procure fine flax lace insertion (imitation) the strips will join beautifully because of the squares in the pattern and it is easy to procure centre medallions in that pattern. The insertion with a very narrow little edging may be used around the edge.

BROWN VS. WHITE EGGS.

The idea that brown-shelled eggs are superior to white eggs probably is a myth and probably had its origin in England, where at one time dark-shelled eggs were preferred to white ones, because the latter always stood for imported eggs. The brown eggs were grown at home, consequently they were fresher and therefore superior. This may account for the popularity of the brown egg in Boston and other New England cities.

For shipping purposes the brown egg is better than the white; its shell is better thicker and tougher. And it may be that the color of the yolks of most brown eggs is somewhat darker, but this is due to a pigment, and does not indicate freshness, richness or a superior flavor. The flavor of an egg is influenced mainly by the food consumed by the layer, all other things being equal.

No matter how fresh eggs may be, the mixed or motley-looking eggs of all sizes and colors lack the selling quality of the more uniform product. A dozen clean, white eggs of uniform size, displayed in a neat carton is very attractive. So are brown eggs, if they are carefully sorted as to size and color, but there are more variations in brown eggs than in whites.
