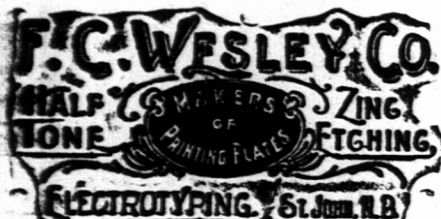

THE BIBLE SOCIETY.

The annual report of the Secretary of the Charlottetown Auxiliary Bible Society and the addresses delivered at the annual meeting last evening will serve to show that at the beginning of the twentieth century the Bible is more widely distributed than ever before, and is looked upon from year to year by greatly increased numbers of our race as the inspired word of God and of highest authority as the guide of faith and conduct. In an age when books have multiplied beyond all precedent, and when translations from all foreign languages have given to the reading world the so-called sacred books of all countries, the effect has been to demonstrate the infinite superiority of this one Book over all others.

The eighteenth century closed amid an insurrection of atheism, in which the giants of unbelief confidently predicted that the Bible would be relegated to the attic and the lumber room, and that the belief in God would speedily become a mere nursery tale. Science was to displace Christianity. Science has indeed made wonderful progress since that day, but its great discoveries and revelations have not shaken the pillars of faith or ousted the Bible from its place in the hearts and minds of men. The feeling grows that science is and must remain inadequate to supply wants that exist within our moral and spiritual natures; that it can give no guiding light as to the relations of man to the Supreme Head of the universe, or a life beyond the grave.

Probably to-day comparatively few persons hold precisely the same views as to the verbal inspiration of the Book as were commonly held in earlier ages. But the central facts that holy men were divinely inspired to write a Book revealing the character of God, His will toward us, the way of life, and what is necessary for men to know and believe in religious and spiritual things, are more widely and generally accepted than ever before. The nineteenth was distinctly a more Christian and also a more humanitarian century than the eighteenth. That it was so was due to the wider dissemination and more intelligent belief in the teachings of the Bible. The best hope for the century upon which we have entered rests upon the same ground.

One of the latest library schemes now fully established in the United States undertakes the delivery of the best, including the latest books, at the residences of subscribers all over the union. The fees are ten dollars a year for three books a week, and five dollars for one book a week. Members may keep a book two weeks, or a year if desired, but can only receive new books by returning those in their possession. Books are delivered to members in the order desired, and the books to be returned are called for at the residences of members.

Sir Sanford Fleming in a letter to the Postmaster General strongly recommends that the Government of Canada shall follow the example set by the Mother Country thirty years ago, acquire the telegraph lines and operate them in connection with the postal service. We believe the proposition will meet with very general favor throughout the Dominion. The idea is thoroughly British and has been worked out very successfully in Great Britain and the Australian Colonies. It will probably be adopted at some more or less distant date in Canada, but we cannot afford to wait so long for an improvement in our telegraph communication with the Mainland.

The Militia Department of Canada has completed arrangements for enlisting 1,000 men for the South African Mounted Police, who are under command of Col. Baden Powell. The pay is on a much more liberal scale than in the regular army, first-class troopers receiving six shillings a day and officers in proportion. There are no doubt many men in Canada who are well adapted for this service, and the full quota required will probably be obtained.

A very pleasant incident in THE GUARDIAN counting rooms this week was the presence of four brothers, who all at one time paid their yearly subscriptions.

Both Toronto and Ottawa elected Conservative Mayors by very large majorities.
