CONSERVATISM VERY STRONG AT MORELL

Liberal Speakers Bested By Conservative Opponent In Presentation of Policies.

In a concise statement of facts Hon. J. A. MacDonald, Conservative candidate for Kings scored point after point over his Liberal opponent, Hon. Dr. Grant at Morell Monday night. Premier Lea, who was present as a lieutenant speaker for Dr. Grant strongly defended The New Zealand Trade treaty in so far as it applied to the better importations. The question of Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, as to why the treaty was abrogated if it were the good policy which the premier claimed it was, remained unanswered. Hon. Dr. Grant opened the discussion with the statement that the crux of the election lies in the question as to whether it would be better to return the King Government to power or not. The speaker's usual historic sketch was spiced with a little additional humor. While in power the King Government, the speaker said, produced eight surpluses, and at the beginning of the administration the railways of Canada were in a state of bankruptcy. A Conservative government, Dr. Grant thought, would, by its tariff measures soon have the Canadian people like Chinese. He stated regarding Dr. Cyrus Macmillan, that the Conservatives accuse the new minister of being a foreigner. The speaker did not believe that Dr. Macmillan was a foreigner. In reference to the Liberal record, Dr. Grant pointed out that the Liberals have taken seven cents a pound of tea, and have returned to the two cent stamp for letters.

Since his appointment as Liberal candidate for King's County, Dr. Grant stated that the constituency has received more money than it has for the last ten years from the Dominion grant to the province. The speaker then went on to tell what the Liberal government had done for Panmure Island when a voice interrupted, "you did not tell us about the dead calf yet," and another, "give us something about butter." The speaker endeavored to comply with the latter request. Dr. Grant did not think returned soldiers would vote for the Tory government, as it will soon be possible for almost every soldier, deservingly, to receive his pension. Dr. Grant next dealt at considerable length with the subject of natural resources. He quoted figures to show that Canada is not depleting her resources. Conservative literature was, in Dr. Grant's opinion "dirty." The Tory party, the speaker declared, is the party of the favored classes. Dr. Grant stated that he felt very happy about the contest and while not prophesying he believed that the King Government will be returned. High protection and a brick wall is a Chinese policy, he explained.

The speaker saw no harm in getting a few ideas from the opposition as the Liberal Party had done in creating the Dunning Budget. Dr. Grant told how Mackenzie King, paid for the present car ferry, spicing his description humorously. He said Mackenzie King had Dr. Cyrus Macmillan appointed Minister of Fisheries the speaker expected that all the intelligent fishermen from White Sands to Savage Harbor would vote Liberal. In concluding Dr. Grant made passing reference to the young cattle killed on the railway.

Hon. John A. MacDonald arose to reply amid loud cheers. He thanked the electors of the district for the

support given him last election. Being a member of the opposition was often difficult, Mr. MacDonald explained, to do as he would desire for the county. Because of the fact that the Conservatives took the same view as did the King Government on the question of liquor clearances, to United States, that government failed to create issues to overshadow the record of its administration.

The budget, which Mr. MacDonald declared was designed to catch votes was next dealt with. In it such items as hay, straw and cut flowers are placed on the British preference list. The matter of estimates for the present year had not been touched in the budget Mr. MacDonald pointed out. He calculated that the revenue would drop \$61,000,000. The balance of trade last year amounted to \$128,000,000 in the wrong direction, and during the last two months it has dropped \$45,000,000.

Mr. MacDonald pointed out that Mackenzie King was not as anxious to go overseas for service as he is now to go over to the Imperial Conference. Mr. MacDonald sat down amid tremendous applause and prolonged cheers.

Mr. MacDonald next proved that the trade treaties negotiated by the King Government have all been detrimental to the welfare of Canadian farmers. Wheat meets in European countries with which Canada has trade treaties, duties as high as 90 cents a bushel. The speaker stated that the principle which applies to New Zealand butter importation also applies to the importation of woollen goods. Many woollen mills in Upper Canada had been put out of business by the Yorkshire spinners in England.

Two years ago two million dollars was voted for the beautification of Ottawa, and in the course of carrying out the scheme buildings more valuable than any found in the Maritime Provinces have been torn down. As a further proof of vast extravagance of the Liberal administration Mr. MacDonald cited the instance of the ten private railway cars reserved for the Cabinet ministers, and the fact that more than half a million dollars was expended last year on automobiles for the same gentlemen.

Mr. MacDonald went on to show that the boasted increase in revenue came out of the pockets of the people. Throughout the whole administration taxation has become heavier and heavier all the time. In five years the average increase was \$51,000,000 a year. Sales tax was increased to six percent, and it took eight years to reduce it below its former level.

What is the use of exporting when we have to import more than we export? Mr. MacDonald asked. The first duty of the government should be to protect the home market, the most important market, the safe and stable market, not let it be exploited by foreigners. United States, the speaker pointed out, exports only ten percent of its production, and Canada permits it to come in free of duty to put her own sons and daughters out of work. Three years ago, the speaker stated, a vote was made in the Island estimates for a new car ferry. The boat has not yet been built. In Quebec it will cost \$2,000,000. In England it would cost \$1,000,000 less. At Egmont Bay a wharf was built by the Liberals which is about 100 yards from the water at low tide. Premier King could not find a representative in P. E. I. fit to be Minister of Fisheries, and it was necessary for him to go to Montreal for Dr. Cyrus Macmillan and force him on the people of Quebec County as nominee. Dr. Macmillan, while he may be a fine literary man, the speaker stated, yet he has no practical knowledge of the industry which he supervises. The subsidies for agriculture and for highways for this province were removed some years ago, and have not been restored, although repeated requests were made by Premier Saunders. The Island is paying its share to the Dominion of the \$5,000,000 for old age pensions, but is not getting a cent in return.

Mr. H. D. McEwen next speaker, remarked that the New Zealand treaty had been defended by one of the Liberal speakers. The butter question and the Old Age Pensions should be sufficient to place the Conservatives in power. People of U. S. import goods to the value of \$15.50 per capita, while Canada imports goods to the value of \$92. It will be seen that U. S. has prospered under a system of protection. No country with the natural resources of Canada can afford to buy great quantities of manufactured goods.

Mr. H. H. Cox and Mr. D. B. MacDonald spoke in rebuttal.

Mr. John MacDougall capably presided as chairman.

Sharkey And Schmeling Will Fight Sept. 25

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 2.—Jack Sharkey, Boston sailorman, signed articles today through his manager Johnny Buckley, for a fifteen round return engagement with Max Schmeling, heavyweight champion in the Yankee Stadium here September 25. The Boston gladiator, who lost his bid for the championship on a foul to Schmeling in four rounds, June 12, agreed to take 12 1/2 percent, the challenger's share of the purse. He also agreed to purchase Schmeling's freedom from Arthur Buelow, deposed manager, out of his own share of the proceeds.

Although Schmeling now is aboard ship for Germany, his manager of choice, Joe Jacobs, probably will sign articles for him within a few days. Schmeling's chief demand regarding a return bout was that he be freed from his former manager, whose contract does not expire until October.
