Breaking through the home team barrier with a brace of tallies in the sixth inning, the picked team from the four American ships in port last night earned a two-all deadlock with the Junior Baseball League leaders, the Knights of Columbus, on the Memorial Field diamond before a large crowd of fans. Held in subjection by the brilliant no-hit pitching of Phil Murphy for five innings, the Navy took a lead in the sixth with straight hits in the top of the sixth to earn their draw with the locals.

The Knights started out fast as they tallied their first run in the home half of the opening frame on an error and two singles. They took a two-run lead in the second inning as they tallied an unearned run on three errors. In the sixth, however, the tars came to life as they tied up the ball game on three of their four hits off the slants of Murphy.

Favorite Draws Outside Position For Hambletonian

GOSHEN, N. Y., Aug. 9 (AP)—Eighteen of the world's finest trotting horses are scheduled to fight it out in the \$69,751 Hambletonian tomorrow. And the luck of the draw for positions could make it one of the most terrific wide-open battles of them all.

Bangaway, the probable post-time favorite, drew no. 18 position on the outside of the second tier at the start.

Instead of starting two tiers of eight horses, with the rest in the third row as usual, officials decided to have two tiers of nine.

This is the second largest field and second richest Hambletonian since the famous harness event for three-year-olds began in 1926. In 1945, 19 horses started while the race was valued at \$73,451 when Guy McKinney won the 28-august 23 years ago.

Bangaway, pride of the C.M. Saunders stable of Toledo, Ohio, is undefeated since he lost his first start of the season to Guy Ambassador in the Matron Stakes at Fairmount, Ill., early in June. The probable second favorite, Martha Doyle, got the no. 1 post.

Despite his luck, however, Bangaway is expected to rule the favorite in a crowd of more than 22,000 persons. The bay colt will be driven by Ralph Baldwin of Lloydminster, Sask., leading money-winning reisman on the Grand Circuit last year. Bangaway was being quoted at 3 to 1.

Martha Doyle will be driven by Frank Ervin. She won the \$15,000 Conching Club Trotting Oaks at Goshen's historic track last month, equalling the world record of 2:05 flat for fillies on a half-mile track.

Derby of Wichita, Kans. Martha Doyle is current second choice in the betting at 5 to 1.
