A WONDERFUL AUCTION.—One of the most successful auctions ever held in this Province was that held at the farm of Mr. C. C. Carver, St. Peter's Road, on Thursday. The day being ideal for the purpose an immense crowd of farmers gathered from the surrounding districts. The proceedings offered for sale. After lively bidding it was knocked down to Mr. P. J. McDonald, of Covehead for the handsome sum of \$7,700 cash. The stock, crop and implements were next offered. Splendid prices were realized on all implements as most of them were new. The stock realized prices as follows: Milch cows (grade) sold from \$140 to \$200; horses from \$190 to \$200; poultry sold at \$6.75 per pair for hens, cockerels at \$4.00 each; oats sold at \$1.42; hay \$23 per ton; potatoes \$1.50 per bushel; turnips 65 cents per bushel of 50 lbs; straw sold per str. \$70. These were all exceptional prices and the proceeds of the sale amounted to \$10,000. It is Mr. Carver's intention to remove to Charlottetown where he intends going into the fox business and trading in general. Mr. Cater who was the auctioneer for the occasion says that in all his experience this sale eclipsed all he has ever attended.

It was moved by Mr. M. J. McLeod, seconded by Mr. Frank Mutch "that the factory and equipment be set up and sold at this meeting." An amendment, "that the factory be refitted and run this summer" was moved by Mr. Matthias Praught, and seconded by Mr. Bernard Doyle. After all the shareholders present had expressed their views on the subject, the amendment was put to the meeting, and was lost by two votes. The motion, on being submitted to the meeting, was carried by a reverse vote—a majority of two. The factory and plant was then set up and sold to the highest bidder, Mr. Fred Nelson, China Point, for \$975. A board of management to wind up the business of the company was then appointed; consisting of Messrs Frank Mutch, Mr. J. McLeod, Matthias Praught, Mr. Philip Rooney was chairman of the meeting, and Seymour Young, secretary.—Q.
