Describes Visit To King's Co. Centres

(Island Traveller in Halifax Herald) The town of Souris is about 50 miles further east are the villages of North Lake, South Lake and Elmira. It is these three settlements situated at the extreme end of the island, overlooking the Gulf of St. Lawrence that I am now going to write about.

The largest of these is Elmira, the eastern terminus of the C.N.R. Rev. G. Carlyle Webster assisted by Rev. J. E. Skinner. About 20 pupils attend the Elmira school and they have been quite active in purchasing war savings stamps and in Junior Red Cross work. The officers of this young organization are:

President - Flora MacNeill. Vice-President Raymond Campbell. Secretary - Treasurer - Adele Campbell.

The school teacher is Eileen McDonald of South Lake. My first call of the day in Elmira was made at a small general store, where I purchased some cigarettes from Mrs. Peter Murphy. The railroad station was the next stop and here I talked with Agent Claude Brothers, who calls Charlottetown his home. Claude is a father in Station Agent and has been stationed at Charlottetown for a number of years.

As I was leaving the station I ran into a gang of sectionmen. There was William Hanlon, who records the books for the boys now serving overseas. The president of the institute is Mrs. Joseph Harris, Mrs. W. F. Pierce is the vice-president and Mrs. A. P. MacPhee, secretary-treasurer.

During my travels today I learned that Elmira has an active branch of the Women's Institute comprising ten members. Each Christmas they send boxes to the boys now serving overseas. The president of the institute is Mrs. Joseph Harris, Mrs. W. F. Pierce is the vice-president and Mrs. A. P. MacPhee, secretary-treasurer.

Departing from Elmira I drove two or three miles to the settlement of North Lake, where I first called at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Campbell. Duncan told me he had been doing some fishing this past summer. The last time I called at the Campbell home he was building a fishing boat. Although I was too late to visit the North Lake school I was informed that there were approximately 15 boys and girls making their homes near the scene of their labors.

Stopping at Mrs. Fraser's store for some much needed gasoline, I was served by her daughter, Carroll, while another daughter, Mrs. Preston Bennett, was attending to several customers in the store. The next stopping place was the home of Charles McCormick, where I met Mrs. McCormick and their daughter, Myra. Two other villagers I saw were Lawrence McLaren, a farmer and George Jarvis, a fisherman. A small fishing village is located at the shore here during the summer, when many fishermen from all parts make their homes nearer the scene of their labors.

Motoring back through Elmira I stopped at the telephone office in South Lake for a minute, where the operator Miss Helen Stewart put through a call for my friend. Before retracing my steps in the direction of Souris, my attention was attracted to a small neat appearing building. It was the South Lake school house, so I got my camera and took a picture of it. This picture appears at the top of this column and I consider it a most suitable one to publish with this recording of the events of the day.

Pte. E. McPhee Of S'side Home From Overseas

Pte. Ernest McPhee, son of Lt. Col. and Mrs. J. A. McPhee, having crossed to Halifax on the hospital ship Lady Nelson, has arrived at his home in Summerside. His twin brother Charles died in action, Sept. 20th last.

His twin brothers enlisted together in Oct. 1942, and did their basic training at Charlottetown and advanced training in Aldershot, N.S., they went overseas in May 1943 and on reaching England they were separated. Ernest served in North Africa and Italy with the West Nova Scotia Regt. He was in hospital for three months and was invalided to England. His brother Jack has been in Italy since the first division went there and his sister Helen is a singing sister with the R.C.A.M.C. overseas.

Pte. McPhee was welcomed on arrival home by Sgt. Ryan on behalf of the Summerside Branch of the Canadian Legion. He is receiving a warm welcome from his many friends who wish that his health will soon be fully restored.

TRANS-ATLANTIC RECORD - MONTREAL, Que. Nov 18 - (CP) - A new westbound Trans-Atlantic record was established yesterday by Trans Canada Air Lines. The time, eleven hours and 26 minutes is half an hour faster than the previous record, made last August by another T.C.A. air-craft in the Trans Atlantic service. The non stop flight from the United Kingdom to Montreal was made in a big Lancaster, piloted by Capt. J. E. Bowker of Ottawa, a veteran T.C.A. pilot. Other members of the crew on the new record flight were second Captain M. Gauthier, of Montreal, F.L.P.B. Gregory, R.C.A.F. of Victoria, navigator, and W.A. Tritter of Calgary, radio officer. There were six passengers on board, as well as 2,500 pounds of mail and 161 pounds of express.

Captain Gauthier now holds the distinction of being a member of the crew on both eastbound and westbound record flights, he being the second captain or co-pilot, of the record-breaking eastbound trip of ten hours and thirteen minutes made earlier this month.
