**THE MANITOBA HARVEST.**

The magnificent harvest of Manitoba and the Northwest has been seriously endangered by the rain and snow which fell since the days when it was cut. For weeks while the grain lay in the fields all operations were suspended. Fine weather has followed and threshing operations have been pushed with the utmost energy, but it is found necessary to dry much of grain before it can be safely stored in the big elevators preparatory to shipment. A despatch to the Ottawa Free Press from Winnipeg dated 31st October tells that Mr. J. G. King has left for the coast after making careful inquiries as to the amount of wheat which will be required to be cleaned or dried this fall at the big drying elevator at Port Arthur. He makes the following remarkable statement: "I do not believe," said Mr. King "that the farmers will be able to get in anywhere near the amount now in the fields. The wheat will be left all winter, of course, in the fields, but the beauty of the western climate is that, outside of a slight discoloration of the wheat, it will be able to stand the freezing. I do not think that more than a third of the crop will be handled this fall."

After making all due allowance for over-statement by Mr. King, and the explanations he gives regarding the fine winter climate of the prairie country, it will still be regrettably apparent that the bad weather of October has inflicted a very severe loss upon the Northwest farmers, just at a time when they were in full expectation of a splendid realization of their best hopes. After all there seems to be much greater certainty about the results of farming operations in Eastern Canada than in the West.

President Diaz of Mexico, who has held that position since 1877, has done much for his country while maintaining a steady popularity among the masses. Under his regime Mexico has prospered and developed beyond anything known before. Railways and public improvements have been constructed while order has been established and maintained and the public credit upheld. He is nominally a constitutional ruler, but does not hesitate to exercise dictatorial powers when the welfare of the masses seem to require it. He recently broke in an arbitrary fashion a corner which the speculators had created. The partial failure of the corn crop this year caused great distress as corn is the main food staple of the poorer people. Taking advantage of the scant supply, grain speculators created a corner and forced market prices up to double and then to quadruple the usual figure. The price of beans, peas, wheat and rye were also advanced. President Diaz, finding that severe suffering was likely to ensue, issued a proclamation suspending the duties on food staples, and he also induced the railroad to lower their freight rates temporarily. The result has been the ruin of the corn gamblers and the relief of the great mass of

the people of Mexico, with acclamations from the multitude. But his action was none the less a dangerous and almost revolutionary one.

At the peace of Paris in 1815, after the fall of Napoleon the British National Debt was £861,039,049, having gone up six hundred million pounds sterling during the 23 years of almost continuous war with France. After Waterloo the debt began to be paid off. In 1837 when Queen Victoria came to the throne it was £353,301,991. The Crimean War sent it up again although in 1857, after the fall of Sebastopol the debt was but £342,418,442. In the next twenty years it was out down more than fifty millions pounds. In March 1859 before the Boer War the debt was £327,562,565, or 226 millions less than after Waterloo. Two years of the Boer War has added about 80 million pounds to the debt.
