With their victory went possession of the Physical Fitness Department trophies.

The Summerside Midgets downed the Parkdale Midgets by a score of 7-1 at the Victoria Park diamond while the Bantam squad from the Western Capital took a clean cut 8-3 victory over the East End Bantams at the East End mud diamond.

MIDGET GAME
