Red Sox Win Eighth Game In Nine Starts

(By The Canadian Press)

Boston Red Sox, making eight of their nine hits off the starting and losing Orval Grove yesterday defeated Chicago White Sox 5-1 for their eighth triumph in their last nine games.

It was achieved behind Joe Dobson and in 48-degree temperature accompanied by a cold, stiff wind which made pop flies out of high clouds into the outfield.

It was Dobson's third victory of the season against one defeat and the fourth in a row for the American League champions. Dobson lost a shutout when the Chicagoans punched across their only run in the sixth.

The big Red Sox inning was the third when Johnny Pesky and Ted Williams walked. After two batters had been retired Dom DiMaggio, Leon Culberson and Hall Wagner singled in succession, each driving in a run.

Ted Williams, who hit two left field homers yesterday, and Bobby Doerr who hit for the cycle (a homer, triple, double and a single), both were hitless today.

Detroit won its fifth straight game behind Freddy Hutchinson at Washington last night, defeating Washington 3-2.

The Tigers pushed over a ninth inning run to break up a pitching duel between Hutchinson and Mickey Haefner of the Senators.

Eddie Lake walked with one out in the ninth and George Kell singled him to third. Lake scored as Roy Cullenbine forced Kell.

Washington took a 2-0 lead in the third inning on three singles and a walk, but the Tigers tied it up in the sixth on Pat Mullin's triple, Hoot Evers' double and Birdie Tebbetts' single.

N. S. Baseball Ass'n Holds Annual Meeting

TRURO, N. S., May 14 (CP) — With the lone exception of fourth vice-president Sammy Melanson of Dominion, N.S., all members of the decade-old Bluebonnet baseball hierarchy were deposed at the largest annual meeting in history of the Nova Scotia Amateur Baseball Association here today.

Clyde Nunn, manager of CJFX Broadcasting Company of Antigonish, N.S., was elected president to succeed A. J. Mason of Springhill, N.S.—neither was present at the meeting.

Hanson Dowell of Middleton, told the 54-club get-together that the Association's definition of amateur was outmoded, and suggested a revised version to parallel that of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, of which he is past president.

Since "most clubs pay their players," he said, an amateur should be "one not now engaged in professional baseball." When this definition did not meet favour with delegates, Dowell proposed one along European lines, which divided "amateurs" into "pure amateurs" and "independents," the latter being those who receive compensation for time lost.

Mr. Dowell said he would ask the Association to accept the European definition at its semi-annual meeting.

Maritimers Perform Well At Sherbrooke

SHERBROOKE, Que., May 14 (CP) — A pair of Maritimers performing with Sherbrooke Baseball Club in the Provincial League have turned in doubly performances in the only game played so far by the Sherbrookes.

Manny McIntyre, Negro star from Fredericton who last winter starred on the all-colored line with Sherbrooke St. Francis hockey squad, holds down the shortstop job and Jimmy Harvey of Saint John is one of the squad's ace hurlers.

Both played in the Maritime Baseball League last season. They started with the Middleton, N.S., nine and in the middle of the season Harvey switched to St. Peter's of Saint John.

In the one game he played McIntyre pitched a double in three trips to the plate and played errorless ball in the field.

Harvey pitched six innings, retiring with a blister on his pitching hand at the end of the sixth. He allowed five hits, struck out two and issued three passes.

McIntyre is no newcomer to the Sherbrooke sporting scene. He finished last season with Sherbrooke Canadians of the border league and was left wing on the Negro line in the winter. The hockey squad were eliminated in the provincial finals by Montreal Royals, this year's Allan Cup winners.

Royals May Carry Canadian Colors At Olympic Meet

MONTREAL, May 14 (CP) — Montreal Royals have been approached unofficially with an offer to represent Canada at the Olympic Games next year and the Canadian senior hockey champions are prepared to accept if their league schedule doesn't conflict with the trip, it was learned today.

Logical choice for the trip, the Allan Cup winners were approached by Canadian Amateur Hockey Association officials during the final series with Calgary Stampede, but Norman Dawe, C.A.H.A. vice-president, said they gave no answer at that time.

Today, Ernie Hamilton, Royals president, said "if it didn't conflict with the Quebec Senior Hockey League schedule we would be willing to go."

Hamilton said Royals have received no details about Olympic plans and emphasized the C. A. H. A. approach was unofficial as there was no certainty at the time that the Montrealers would win the Allan Cup.

A. Sidney Dawes, president of the Canadian Olympic Association, said in Toronto last night that it was up to the C. A. H. A. to nominate a team for the Olympics. Norman Dawe didn't indicate today when this might be done as apparently the situation will remain on an informal basis until such time as Royals decide whether they can make the trip.

The winter Olympics will be held in February at St. Moritz and one member of Royals executive said last night the team "could fly over and fly back and the whole trip would consume about three weeks."

Horsemen's Ass'n Chalks Up Another Victory In Ontario

TORONTO, May 14 (CP) — The Horsemen's Benevolent Protective Association Canadian Division today chalked up another success in its drive for increased minimum purses on Ontario race courses when two more Toronto tracks fell into line.

Both Thorncliffe and Dufferin tracks, which open within the next few weeks, agreed to the horse-owner's demand for minimum purses of \$1,350. Earlier old Woodbine track, opening May 17, agreed to the same minimum.

The three successes followed one defeat when directors of the Greenwood Park meeting, which had been scheduled to open at Woodbine May 3, decided to call it off rather than meet the increases.

At that the successes were compromises. The owners originally had demanded \$1,500 minimums, with the track operators indicating they would go as high as \$1,250.

INGLEWOOD, Calif., May 14 (AP) — Captain Cash became the first horse to win five races at the harness meeting at Hollywood Park today, pacing home a half length in front of Mighty Lucy in the sixth race before 7,664 fans.

Favored to win, Captain Cash, timed at one minute, 30 2-5 seconds for six furlongs. Optimus won the day's feature, a \$2,500 trot, with Countess Lena second and Visalia Mac third, in time of two minutes, 5 4-5 seconds for the mile race.

Formulates Rules For Ump's Safety

EDMONTON, May 15 (CP) — Baseball and fastball umpires probably take more abuse from fans than do hockey officials, says Lorrimer (Lethbridge Herald) Fenwick.

He brings the attention of sport fans to eight "safety rules" recently promulgated by the "Lethbridge Umpire's Protective Association." And it seems safe to say that if carried out, the umpires will have their revenge for years of back-talk and (horror) fast-cuffs from fans.

—The Rules— Without further ado, we list the aforementioned safety rules.

(1) Always carry at least one six-shooter in plain sight so that mouthy fans won't get tough with you too early in the game.

(2) Pay a small bow 25 cents prior to the game to stand directly behind the wire screen and call you "robber, stinker," etc. Then walk over and clout him on the nose.

Finds American League A Mess

NEW YORK, May 14 (AP) — Muddy Ruel, having escaped from the confines of Commissioner Chandler's office into the bright sunshine of big league management, is finding the American League a mess in this first whirl around the loop.

The freshman manager of St. Louis Browns, starting a new career at the age of 31, finds it hard to believe what he sees.

"This is a very strange season," he observed. "The clubs that are supposed to be up there aren't and the hitters who are supposed to hit are down at the bottom of the list."

"Perhaps it's the weather. I don't know. Look at our club. I know we have better hitting than we have shown so far. Jeff Heath, Vern Stephens, Johnny Beardo and Walt Judnich all can hit. We know that off this past record. But they're down in the low 200s."

"Our kids have been pulling us along, as far as we've gone. Fellows like Bob Dillinger and Paul Lehner, more or less on trial, I'm also high on Ray Coleman, a kid outfielder."

Ruel, who resigned as special assistant to the commissioner to manage the Browns, hasn't given up on first baseman Jerry Witte, who won the job from Chuck Stevens in Miami but lost it to outfielder Judnich in the last few days. Witte hit 46 homers for Toledo last season and was expected to add more power to the St. Louis attack.

"We're only seven games out of first place. That's the important thing. Not where we are in the league standings. Our pitching hasn't been bad and we're bound to start hitting one of these days."

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"Beaten By Better Team" Says Arbour

MONTREAL, May 13 (CP) — "We did it—I knew we could," war hooped Captain Pete Morin as he and his teammates entered their dressing room after defeating Calgary Stampede 8-2 last Monday night when Montreal Royals brought the Allan Cup back to Montreal for the first time in 17 years.

The Montreal dressing room was besieged by jubilant and happy players. The team sang "Alouette and congratulated each other."

Immediately after the game Coach Frank Arbour of the Calgary team rushed across the ice to congratulate coach Frank Carlin of Montreal. Said Arbour: "You fellows had more on the ball—we were beaten by a better team which every one of my players will admit. We are not downhearted and hope to get another chance to play Montreal in the series next year."

The prize the Royals have tried to win for 17 years was absent. The C.A.H.A. officials forgot to send the Allan Cup from Toronto to Montreal for presentation here tomorrow at a civic reception for the Royals.

Defenceman Doug Harvey of Royals, who turned in a brilliant game was the first man out of the rink after the game.

"I've waited 12 years to play on an Allan Cup team, and tonight I did—boy was it hot out there," said little Pete Morin as he wiped the sweat off his forehead. Goalie Jerry McNeil, said little and rushed to the showers before

his team mates had an opportunity to congratulate him. Baskets of flowers were brought into the dressing room and the players tossed them at Coach Frank Carlin playfully.

On the other side of the rink, Calgary retired to the showers. They had little to say, but all were strong in their praise for Montreal.

"That little Pete Morin sure is dangerous," volunteered goalie Russ Dertell, "you never know what he's going to do next." During the game, the packed rink resembled a baseball stadium. Thousands sat cut the game in shirt sleeves, and one gentleman sitting up near the rafters was seen stripped to the waist.
