THOSE wishing to spend a pleasant holiday could not do better than attend the Gathering of the Clans. It will be difficult to find a more delightful piece of scenery than that afforded the excursionist as he crosses the Morell River by way of the floating bridge. Only a short distance over the bridge the widest part of St. Peter's Bay is reached. The railroad follows the Bay for six miles. In the distance is the light house of St. Peter's Harbor and the sand hills. The land on the south side of the river is higher than the surrounding country, and it is not difficult to obtain an excellent view. Marie, the next river is two miles in length and the country is said to have been thickly settled by French. St. Peter's Bay is nine miles long and not over one wide. After travelling some 2 1/2 miles Midgell River is reached. It abounds with bass and trout. Perhaps the prettiest piece of scenery of all is the village of St. Peter's with the beautiful Roman Catholic church and other modern buildings. The village is nine miles from the mouth of the harbor where the old French chapel once stood. Mr. John Sinnott's house is now located on the site.
