WORD has been received here of the death of George E. Mawley of Montreal which occurred at 11.30 o'clock Wednesday night. Deceased had been ill of cancer of the stomach for some months. THREE were shipped by the Northumberland Wednesday morning en route to Manitoba eight head of pure bred Aberdeen Angus cattle from the herd of John Richards, Bideford. This is probably the most valuable lot of cattle that ever left the Maritime Provinces. They have been sold to two of the most prominent breeders of these cattle in Manitoba who are certainly to be congratulated upon securing such high class specimens of this famous breed. The lot comprises one bull, two years old, one bull calf five months old, four cows, one yearling heifer and one heifer calf. The bull is a magnificent animal and a typical representative of the breed. He has great substance, stands on short legs, with fine bones, and though only in moderate condition, weighs about 1800 lbs. At the head of Mr. Richards' herd this animal won the sweepstakes over bulls of all ages at Toronto Fair last fall when only one year old; and it is therefore reasonable to assume that he is the best bull of the breed in all Canada. The bull calf is also a good one in all respects. He weighs over 600 lbs at five months old. The cows are all excellent specimens, being low set and with great depth of body and smooth in outline. Any one of them will turn the scales at over 1300 lbs. (though only in breeding condition and just off the grass. These cattle will assuredly uphold the honor and prestige of the breed in the far off provinces and will also reflect credit upon our Island stock. Our great western provinces with their boundless resources and immense possibilities in live stock raising are destined at no distant day to become the home of some of the best pure bred herds in the world; and it is therefore pleasing to know that some of their most prominent breeders in seeking new blood for their herds, are passing by Ontario and making their purchases in the little province by the sea. It is claimed, and no doubt with much truth, that there is no spot in the world where cattle, in fact all kinds of domestic animals, are freer from disease than on this Island. Here, tuberculosis, pleuro and many other ills that are so common among cattle in many other countries, are practically unknown; and were this fact more generally known throughout Canada, the United States and elsewhere, unquestionably our stock would be readily sought—especially for breeding purposes. How important it is then that our government should rigidly enforce the laws which have been enacted regarding the examination by competent veterinarians of all live stock, especially cattle brought to our shores, and allow none to land which cannot pass the test for tuberculosis and otherwise show a clean bill of health, so as to maintain the reputation for that freedom from disease which we now claim to possess. It is much easier, considering our isolation, than other places to enforce such laws; and their enforcement would give this province an advantage in the cattle markets of the world. However it is to be hoped that this trade with the west, so auspiciously begun, will continue and enlarge.
