Henry who was the only link between the Germans and the Allies up to the time of the presentation of the treaty has ended his activities. The Germans have generally relaxed their rigid routine of the past few days and walked in the park this morning.

home meal or an ostermoor mattress. He felt sure this warm Prince Edward Island welcome would be extended to those yet returning till the last man was home.

Sergt. Lowther followed in a brief speech in which he related some humorous incidents of the war and kept the house in roars of laughter. In conclusion he added his tribute to those already paid the Premier, and had very much pleasure in stating that he knew from personal experience how wide open the Premier's door was to those who needed his assistance. In connection with his, Mr. Lowther's, duties, it was necessary very often to go to the Premier's office and he not only found the door always open to him, but he received the most kindly assistance when he went in.

Corporal R. L. Cotton was next called upon. He had great pleasure, he said, in adding his commendation for what Premier Arsenault had done for the province during his tenure of office. As men judge largely by contrast this meeting of friends must be to the Premier a most agreeable contrast to the meetings he had been attending during the first few weeks in the Provincial Building.
