World Union Of Church Not Near

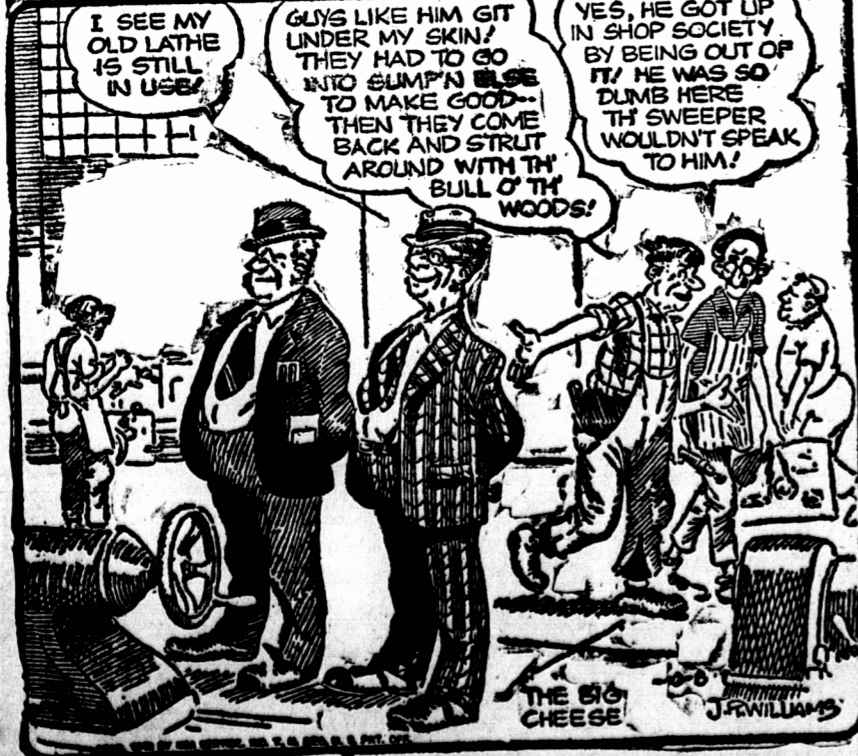

HALIFAX, Oct. 6—Most Rev. C. F. Kingston, Primate of all Canada, said today that discussions at the recent World Council of Churches made it evident there would be no world union of Protestant Churches for "a long time."
The Primate returned home yesterday after an absence of three months in Europe and other parts of Canada. He attended the Lam-

both Conference in London and the World Council of Churches conference in Amsterdam.
Referring to the World Council as "a most significant gathering," Archbishop Kingston said: "We hope it is very significant for the future, as it enabled a very large part of Christendom to speak with a united voice on many world issues."
"There was a very candid discussion of the differences which separate the various denominations and the discussions made it clear that it will take a long time to accomplish church union."
"Meanwhile, it is very hopeful that the denominations will cooperate in dealing with important problems before humanity".
