**Munitions Purchases Take Jump**

OTTAWA, July 25.—(CP)—During the first three months of its existence from April 9 to July 9, the Department of Munitions and Supply awarded more contracts than during the preceding nine months by the two predecessors purchasing bodies. Munitions Minister Howe announced today.

From July 1939, to March 31, the Defence Purchasing Board and the War Supply Board placed a total of 11,700 contracts, while during the first three months of this year the extension of plant construction of munitions and supply contracts totalled 12,336.

Contracts placed by the department during the last three months amount approximately to \$65,800,000. This figure does not include commitments made for new plant construction or extension of plant facilities amounting in all to approximately \$50,000,000.

**U. S. Studies**

WASHINGTON, July 25.—(AP)—The House of Representatives Foreign Affairs Committee today voted to watch Belgian children "trying to find some protection" during the battle of Flanders, and to send their youngsters shipped to the United States.

"All agreed that was the right hardest for these children," said the committee's report, "and that some way be found to use the United States vessels to bring British children out of harm's way."

The committee is studying the question of amending the Neutrality Act to permit such a service, and to allow travel of American vessels in war zones.

Chairman Sol Bloom, New York Democrat, asserted that the whole bill, which would amend the Neutrality Act, is incorporated in bills by Representative Thomas Hennings, Missouri Democrat, and Emanuel Celler, New York Democrat, and the only question was how the job might be accomplished.

**Showers Cool Sections Of United States**

CHICAGO, July 23.—(AP)—Scattered showers cooled some sections of the United States today but most residents at the broad sweltered beneath an oppressive and the Atlantic looked in vain for signs of relief.

Pennsylvania, New York and New England enjoyed a temperate interlude while the Midwest suffered anew from nature's blitzkrieg.

Deaths attributed directly to the heat increased to 52 and the total of drownings rose to 165.

Fifty cases of exhaustion were reported in Washington, D. C., alone, in the midst of 90-degree weather. Nebraska recorded readings in three figures for the seventh day in a row. Crops there showed the withering effects of the siege.

The scope and severity of the sultry spell was measured by temperature in Pierre, S. D., 98 in Milwaukee, 94 in Des Moines and Indianapolis. In Chicago the highest mark of the summer—95—was registered. Duluth, Minn., had a top of 90, a record for the year.

**FRENCH FIGHT AGAIN**

Gen. Charles de Gaulle, leader of French forces continuing the war declared in a broadcast to all Frenchmen in the French struggle against Germany and Italy "will be resumed shortly on sea and on land. French arms, rejoining the battle in the air above German territory, July 21, he said.

**Death Penalty To Be Mandatory For "Treachery"**

OTTAWA, July 25.—(CP)—Death as the punishment for treason was the virtually unanimous verdict of the House of Commons which today passed an act providing the extreme penalty for those who assist the enemy or impede efforts of His Majesty's Forces.

The bill, introduced July 8 by Justice Minister Lapointe on recommendation of the committee appointed to review the Defence of Canada regulations, was given third reading and sent to the Senate.

It featured the first of the all day sittings which will continue, except for Saturday and Sunday of this week, until Parliament progresses, probably sometime next week.

Adoption of the drastic measures against sabotage and fifth column activities was a triumph for Arthur Slight (Lib. Party) who recommended such action early this session.

M. J. Coldwell (COP) Rosestow-Biggar made an effort to provide some option for the trial judge by suggesting that a sentence of life imprisonment as an optional penalty for treason.

Finance Minister Isley, chairman of the committee which drafted the bill, said the committee rejected a similar amendment and the government could not accept it. The amendment was defeated on a roll call of yeas and nays.

Members representing all parties, most of them having served on the Defence of Canada Regulations Committee, spoke on the treachery and fifth column activities. At the mention of the necessity of preventing in Canada acts of treason such as contributed to the downfall of Norway the Low Countries and Belgium.

The section dealing with treason and imposing the death penalty is copied from the United Kingdom's Treachery Act, for which life imprisonment is imposed if taken from the British defence regulations and applies to any person who "does any act which is likely to assist the enemy or prejudice the public safety, the defence of the realm or the efficient prosecution of the war."

The more serious offence of treason, punishable by death, is defined as any act which is designed or likely to assist the enemy or prejudice military or air operations of the enemy, to impede such operations of His Majesty's Forces, or to endanger the safety of the realm.

Mr. Coldwell said he had more respect for the treachery act than for the Defence of Canada Regulations because the former retained the right of the courts to determine if the subject were safeguarded against the law.

Howard Green (Con. Vancouver South), delegated to speak on the bill for the official opposition, said the bill was necessary. The government had seen the necessity of such a measure and enacted it last May and there was ample evidence to indicate that Canada could do so.

Before adjourning for dinner the report of the committee on unemployment insurance was tabled by Minister McLarty. It commended the bill and suggested a few minor amendments.

**SLEEP DOWNSTAIRS TO BEAT AIR-RAID**

MANCHESTER, July 25.—(CP)—In these days of air-raids in England and Scotland, why not, for safety and convenience, sleep downstairs and live up, asks a correspondent of the Guardian.

The writer continues: "People in recent raids were caught by the first bombing upstairs and in bed. We are recommended to go downstairs at the first alarm, and, apart from the exception which proves the rule, downstairs is the safest place and the cellar safest of all."

"The transformation is made, the theoretical difficulties of living upstairs and sleeping downstairs disappear. In the house with dining-room, kitchen, and drawing room downstairs, the drawing room or lounge upstairs. Living upstairs is very pleasant. A difficult outlook opens up surprisingly from the armchair, and outside activities not visible from lower rooms add to the interest."

"The moral effect of sleeping downstairs is great. Gone is that uneasy feeling that one must keep half-awake to be ready to descend to the lower rooms at a second's notice. Both air-raid shelter outdoors or strengthened rooms indoors are more swiftly available; the invalid and the weak then remain there during a raid."

In view of the proposal of the Government to raise the standard of teaching in this Province, candidates for Teacher's Licenses of the Second Class are now required to take a year of Academic study as well as a year of normal training, after passing the Entrance Examination to Prince of Wales College.

Students who have now passed the Entrance Examination for the first time will be eligible for the opening of the College Term and may take: either (a) the Academic Course qualifying for entrance to University or entrance to the Normal Training class or class of (b) a course in Commerce which extends over two years.

Though the Academic course leading to completion of High School or University normally demands two years of study in advance of Prince of Wales College Entrance requirements, candidates who have made satisfactory high school work (or upwards) will be given an opportunity to complete this work in one year, and if successful will be admitted to the classes in First Year University classes, or to the Normal Training classes.

Students who have already attended Prince of Wales College but who failed to complete the requirements for Second Class Teacher's License will be allowed this session to complete the course as prescribed in former years.

Young and immature students making a low pass mark in the Entrance Examination should come at this stage to Prince of Wales College, but should remain another year at school, and obtain a better educational groundwork before incurring the great expense of the course at College.

Every student that purposes attending Prince of Wales College must fill out and return to the "Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown" the form which is found enclosed with the report card received from this entrance examination, at once or at a date not later than August 10th, and all former students who intend to return to College and join the classes of the First, Second, Third or Fourth Year should also notify the College office on or before the date so that arrangements may be made for classification and accommodation.

The College office will be closed from August 5th to 12th inclusive, and open thereafter from 9 till 12 o'clock only each morning of the week.

Prince of Wales College will open on Tuesday, September 3rd, at 2:00 p.m. All students of the Second, Third, and Fourth Year classes will then be enrolled and classes formed. On Wednesday, September 4th at 2:00 p.m. all students of the First Year will be enrolled; those from Charlottetown at 10:00 a.m. and those from the country at 2:00 p.m. All Commerce students of the Second, Third and Fourth Years will enroll on Tuesday, 2:00 p.m.

Students' fees will be payable at the College on the day of registration. In the case of Third and Fourth Year students, fees may be paid half-yearly. For the First and Second Year students the fee for the ordinary course are \$10.00 for country students from Charlottetown and \$20.00 for those from the country and \$35.00 for those from the foreign. For Third Year students the fee is \$100.00 and for the Fourth year \$100.00 and \$150.00 respectively for country and Charlottetown students.

The public schools with six weeks' holidays will open on Tuesday, August 13. All other schools except those of Charlottetown and Summerside will open on August 27th.
