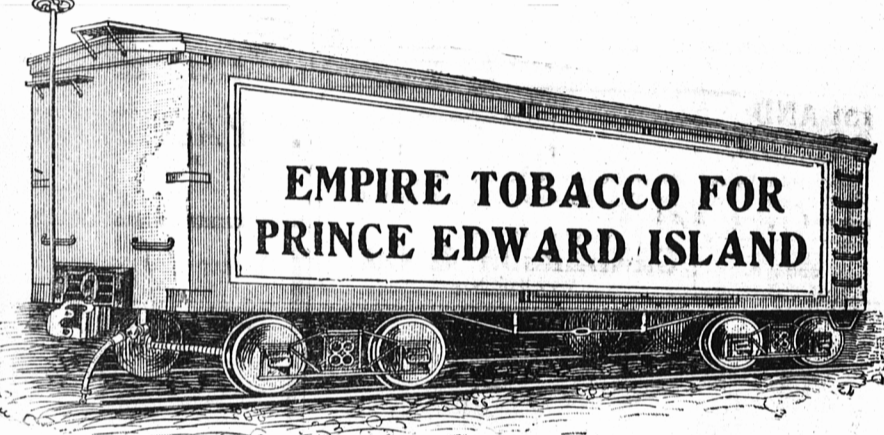

A RECORD SHIPMENT

This Special Train Has Left St. Thomas With 1,211,351 Lbs. of Canadian Leaf.

A week ago last Saturday a new record was made on the C. P. R. in the largest shipment of tobacco leaf ever made in Canada. A special train of thirty-one (31) cars, all laden with the fragrant leaf, was made up in St. Thomas, Ont., for shipment to Granby, Que. The weight of the tobacco contained in these cars reached the huge total of 1,211,351 lbs., about 31,000 bales, all Ontario is to be congratulated that the culture of tobacco has grown to such dimensions in that province and the C. P. R. deserve congratulations for their handling of this record shipment.
