### RUSSIA'S HUMILIATION.

The Russian Black Sea fleet before the mutiny consisted of seven battleships, three cruisers and a number of smaller war craft. Of these the flagship, the Kniat Potemkin, was the largest with one exception and the newest and swiftest. One other battleship of 12,500 tons equalled the flagship in tonnage, but was otherwise an older and slower ship. It is significant that the mutiny took place on the flagship, where it might have been expected that discipline would have been most perfect and everything most satisfactory. But it is characteristic of everything Russian in these days that the trouble is at the top. The Vice Admiral happened to be absent at the time of the mutiny, having been called to St. Petersburg, otherwise he would doubtless have shared the fate of his officers. The mutiny seems to have added a last drop to the cup of Russia's humiliations. Following the destruction or capture of her Pacific fleet and her Baltic fleet, the war ships in the Black Sea were all that

remained of Russia's naval strength. These ships were, it is true, unable to take part in the present war because of being shut up in the closed waters behind the Bosphorus. But this was also their salvation. In the Black Sea they were at least safe from Japanese attack. Had they gone to the Far East they might have been captured or sunk. It remained for mutiny to strike where the guns of the enemy could not reach. Russia's weakness is at home, in the danger of revolution growing out of the disaffection of her people and their alienation from the governing power because of oppression. Disaffection is shown to exist in the fleet; it exists in the army also, for in these days it is true as in the days of Kosuth that "bayonets think". Under free governments every citizen is a prop to the throne. Under autocracy a disaffected people come to learn that the throne is not established in righteousness, but that it symbolises serfdom and oppression. They come to regard the ruler as their enemy, and will not hesitate to overturn the throne itself and slay the ruler if by that means and no other they

can gain their freedom. Russia on a war footing is represented by six million bayonets, but Russia in her present weakness is unable to send another soldier to the East where they are so much needed, because they must be kept at home to protect the throne against the Russian people. So we have Russia today with the largest armed force ever marshalled under one flag and yet ignominiously beaten, humiliated beyond measure and forced to treat for peace on terms dictated by an enemy of not one third her numbers. It is a spectacle for the nations and the ages.

### THE LATE WILLIAM MACPHAIL.

It is with deep regret that The Guardian announces the death which took place yesterday at his home of William Macphail, Orwell after a brief illness extending over only several weeks. The deceased about two years ago resigned his position as Bursar of Falconwood Hospital and since then has been at his home. He was in his customary good health until two weeks ago when he began to fail and gradually succumbed. Mr. Macphail was a well-known figure in the community which he served for over sixty years, first as teacher, then as Inspector of Schools, and later as Supervisor of the Hospital for Insane at Falconwood. He was born in Inverness, Scotland, and came to Prince Edward Island, when quite young, with his father, the late William Macphail of King's College, Aberdeen. He was an elder of the Church of Scotland for fifty-five years, and was known during that long period as an entirely worthy man. Indeed few men have been more widely esteemed for kindness and generosity, for uprightness of life, simplicity of nature, and firmness of character. His wife and nine children survive him, and they have just cause to revere his memory.

### THE NATIONAL COUNCIL.

The National Council of Canadian Women has completed its session in our midst and today many of its members set on return to their homes east and west. Their stay amongst us has been all too brief. That the Council has produced a highly favorable impression upon all who have attended its sessions, our leading public men and our newspapers have stated in all sincerity and truth. The visiting delegates have made us more than ever proud of the women of Canada, who, we believe stand unsurpassed in all the virtues and graces. The National Council has shown itself a very capable, business-like and conservative body. It has shown no disposition to revolutionise the established order of society, to usurp authority, or to invade the assumed rights and prerogatives of men. It has labored entirely along non-controversial lines, and in everything for the amelioration, the betterment and the uplifting of all. We bespeak for the national organization of women a wide and ever-enlarging field of usefulness in our growing Dominion. We trust the delegates have in fair measure enjoyed their visit to our city and in parting we assure them that when in future years Charlottetown shall again be selected as the place of meeting—may it not be long hence—our city will feel honored by the recognition and flattered by their presence.

### THE TUNNEL TEA TODAY.

It is seldom that we have on this Island a public demonstration and festivity of so much provincial interest as that which is to take place at Cape Traverse today and which will pass into history as the Tunnel Tea of 1905. There the dividing waters are narrowest; there the electric cable for half a century has borne its messages to and fro beneath the water; there from time immemorial the ice-boats have made their perilous crossings in winter. There the Tunnel is to be bored and the missing link in our railway connection with the mainland of Canada is to be supplied.

Sports and games, music and oratory, feasting and song will contribute to the pleasures of the day. There will be something for every one and through it all a note of patriotism and of hope, looking to the emancipation of our fair Province from the chilling blight of winter isolation and the fetters which have so long shackled our industry and commerce. The presence of all who can go is desired, in order that this great movement may receive a new impetus from the numbers, the enthusiasm and the hearty endorsement of those who attend. We believe that those who shall visit Cape Traverse today will be well repaid, in the present enjoyment of the demonstration, in what they shall see and hear, and above all in the furtherance of a worthy and patriotic object.
