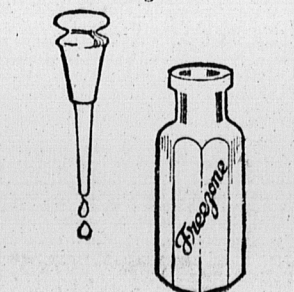

He was here endeavoring to secure about 200 laborers to go to Northern Ontario to work on the construction of a large dam, an undertaking which will cost \$3,000,000. The job is expected to last from a year to a year and a half. The fares of any men undertaking to go on this work will be paid to destination. Mr. Sorrer leaves this morning for Moncton and Bathurst and expects to be back within ten days. THE HEALTH REPORT.—There is an outbreak of influenza at present in the town adjoining Dundas caused by some lumbermen who came home sick with the trouble from New Brunswick. In all there are about fifty cases, confined to some nine or ten families. About one quarter of the cases have developed pneumonia. Half of these are recovering while half still remain serious. School and churches are closed and the afflicted families are isolated, and it is hoped the disease will not spread further. Dr. Morris is in attendance.

THE WAYSIDE PIPER

TO BE PRESENTED SATURDAY IN HEARTZ MEMORIAL HALL

"The Wayside Piper," to be presented by the Dalvay Camp Girls in Heartz Memorial Hall on Saturday, at 8 p. m., is based upon the old story of the "Pied Piper of Hamelin."

Into the Piper's flute, Faith and Hope and Love have breathed the essence of themselves to produce a clear spiritual melody with which the Piper goes forth into the way-side places of modern life to awaken a responsiveness from all kinds of girls.

In the Frolics it is shown how the Piper got his music and the three graces are personified by three young girls taking the parts of Faith, Hope and Love, who give to his music its strength and joy and tenderness. In the council scene which follows, the Spirit of Service has called together her Councilors from workshop, field and campus to discuss the problem of the needs of girls. Each councillor states what she sees to be the need of her girls and there seems to be no evident solution for the problem until the Wayside Piper, wandering in, overhears their words and pipes his magic music. Then to him is given the sacred charge of going out into the highways of the world to attune the inner lives of girls to his clear, true notes. Three short scenes are given representing industrial, country and college girls and showing how the piper succeeds in awakening a response, giving them new joy and the consciousness of a purpose in life. In the closing scene the Piper brings all the girls together, and in a final hymn draws forth from them the expression of a new faith in God and a desire to extend His Kingdom.

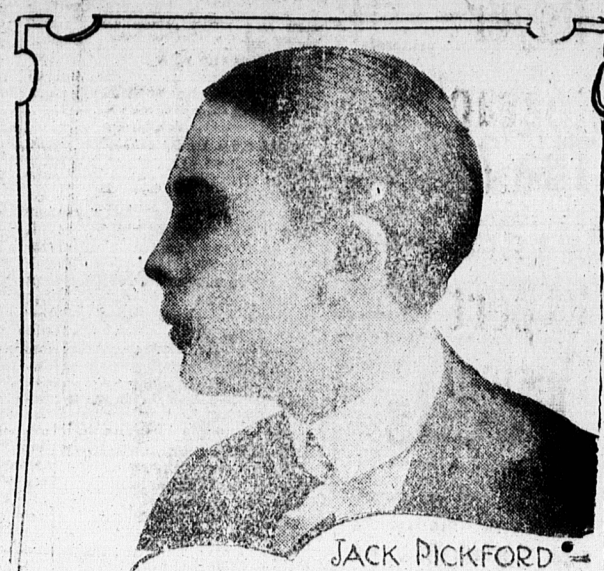

AN OTHER GIFTED SON OF P.E.I. TO THE FRONT

Hon. Alexander Campbell, M.D., Minister of Agriculture and Mines in the Newfoundland Cabinet.

The political upheaval in Newfoundland, which resulted in the overthrow of the Cashin Government, has brought a gifted Prince Edward Islander to the forefront in the public life of the ancient colony. Dr. Alexander Campbell, minister of agriculture and mines in the Squires cabinet, is a native of Souris, P. E. I., was educated at Prince of Wales College, and for a time taught school in his home town. Later he studied medicine at McGill University, where he made an exceptionally high record, and after taking his degree entered upon the practice of his profession in Newfoundland. For the past dozen years or more Dr. Campbell has been recognized as one of the most skilled and successful members of his profession in St. John's. Having had a decided bent for public affairs from his early years, and being a close student and keen observer of political developments for years past, it is not surprising that this gifted young doctor, has finally gravitated into the arena of public life, where it is safe to predict, a brilliant and

and useful career lies before him. Newfoundland's new minister of agriculture and mines is brainy, well-educated, progressive and thoroughly equipped by his gifts, training, and temperament, for the exacting duties of public office. In other respects too Dr. Campbell is of the type that is most needed in public life. A man of the highest integrity, a profound sense of public responsibility, and the best political ideals, his influence as a legislator and a minister of the crown is certain to make for the betterment of public life, in a country where, judging by recent events, there is considerable room for administrative improvements. If Premier Squires has been as fortunate in the selection of his other colleagues as he has been in the choice of his Minister of Agriculture, his government should prove one of the strongest and best that has held office in Newfoundland for many years.
