DEVELOPMENT.

There is fascination as well as contagion in the new life that is coming to these eastern provinces. We in Prince Edward Island have done some boasting and some advertising and some prophesying and we have produced the goods to show abundant reason for our faith. But we are not alone in our boasting and our prophesying, nor are we alone in the ability to produce the goods. Our sister provinces are booming and our sister cities are taking time by the forelock. In St. John, N.B., for example, a campaign is now on foot to increase the membership of the Board of Trade to 1200, the idea being that the board, collectively and individually, shall take a lively personal interest in a campaign to get new industries for the city and to help in every possible way in the expansion and improvement of the city. The plan is a capital one. It suggests co-operation, the enthusiasm that comes of mutual helpfulness, the development of loyalty to the city by combined activity, in short, it means the infusion of new life both into the Board of Trade and into the city.

We in Charlottetown have collectively and individually expressed, long and loudly, our unalterable faith in

the future of the province and of the city, our unshaken conviction that there is no more suitable location in the maritime provinces than Charlottetown for certain industries. And we are still convinced but, apart from certain indefinite rumors of prospective establishments, nothing has been or is being done.

One of our chief weaknesses is that we are advertising aimlessly, unsystematically and therefore ineffectively. We need combined effort, co-operation, a pull all together. And what better means for such pull, what better source of enthusiasm, what better means to enlist and combine the scattered wisdom of the city than through such a body as the Board of Trade. Every normal adult male in the city should be a member, and would be if properly approached and shown the advantages to himself personally and to the city, of his membership.

The Board, so constituted and so representative, would be in a position to devise and carry out development ideas which would be of incalculable benefit to the city. Such re-organization would cost something but it would be self-sustaining and would pay.

A STRIP OF ICE.

There is something suggestive of "our times" in the smooth, well polished strip of ice on the sidewalk. How few boys can resist the temptation of taking the slide, of going at least so far without the usual method of propulsion, without the effort of walking! It is an opportunity to get something for nothing, a free ride, a shoot through the air.

What matter if it wears off the boot soles? They can be repaired. What matter if it means a disastrous landing on the rough ground beyond? There are as many chances in favor of a safe landing as of disaster. Occasional bloodstains along the route show, alas, that there have been disasters but they are unheeded and the slide is kept smooth by succeeding feet, and the stains tell their story. The smooth strip of ice is not confined exclusively to the pathway of the boy. It meets him as he grows older. In after years he will be seized with the desire to go forward at a faster and easier rate than the slow and conventional walk; to take short cuts aside from the beaten path. And along the way that he travels he, too, will find bloodstains which tell of disasters but they will convey no warning to him. They were only for the unfortunate and the awkward, not for him, and he takes his

chances. And the bloodstains along the whole way tell that he was, at least occasionally, mistaken.

The boy never grows older. The "child is father to the man" and the child-father sets the pace through life. The slide along the icy sidewalk may take the shape of a shoot through the air in an aeroplane, a joyride in an auto or an expedition in search of the South Pole or the North Pole. In either case it is the boy yielding to the joy of an unconventional pace, to the fascination of braving a danger which, if successfully negotiated, means glory.

And this strip of ice, whether on the sidewalk or on life's highway is not without its benefits. Taken in the proper boyish spirit it affords an exhilarating boost along the way, a cheery whoop and halloo in a walk which too often becomes monotonous and wearisome. It emphasizes the necessity of caution; a false step or an unexpected "arrival" at the danger point may mean disaster.

NOTES

A few days ago a Charlottetown lady advertised in The Guardian for a servant. Before 6 p. m. there were 14 applications for the position, giving the lady an excellent opportunity to select and plenty material to select from. The incident demonstrates two very important facts; first, that there are still lots of young women in Prince Edward Island notwithstanding the complaint so frequently heard that they have nearly all gone west; and second, that it always pays to advertise in The Guardian.

The Democrats at Washington declare their intention of carrying out their policy of substantial tariff reduction and of putting food stuffs practically on the free list in order to reduce the cost of living. Representatives of the United States farmers protested strongly before the Ways and Means Committee against allowing Canadian meats, cereals and other foodstuffs in free. The Underwood free-list bill, which passed the House at last session and will be re-introduced, is endorsed by Mr. Wilson, the President-elect. It includes agricultural implements, cotton bagging, cotton ties, leather, boots and shoes, fencewire, meats, cereals, breads, flour, timber, sewing-machines, salt and other articles.

Pretty frosty weather. Even the natural gas became frozen in Moncton the other night. It hasn't come to that with us here yet. Our natural gas still runs strong. One marked and welcome effect of the frosty weather is the assurance of a good ice harvest which is now being stored and of which serious fears were entertained during the extremely mild early winter. The snowless winter has struck several industries somewhat heavily, among them lumberers and those dealing in firewood. The demand for sleighs has perhaps not been as brisk as good sleigh-roads would have made it but the dealers in this line also handle car-

FRANCE SEES PERIL IN GERMAN ARMAMENT

PARIS, Feb. 11.—Anglo-German naval relations are the principal subject of discussion in the French press just now. The predominant sentiment is suspicion of Germany naturally. The Figaro dwells particularly on the fact that Germany diminishes her naval armament, which threatens England, only to increase her military power, which threatens France. The Echo de Paris takes much the same line and draws the conclusion that France must augment her army. The Gaulois hopes there is no truth in the reports of an Anglo-German naval understanding, as it would intensify the danger for France.

ATTEMPT TO DEFEAT BORDEN NAVY POLICY

LONDON, Feb. 10.—The London Daily Telegraph yesterday published a startling announcement from a correspondent to the effect that a number of Government supporters are taking concerted action to defeat the Borden naval policy. They are anxious, says the correspondent, to do all in their power to rehabilitate the scheme of Laurier, and are working in close association with Hon. W. S. Fielding, who came to this country immediately after the introduction of the Borden naval bill. These M.P.'s have already seen Asquith and Churchill with the view of prevailing upon them to alter their attitude towards the Borden scheme, thus assisting the Liberal party in the Dominion. Their section has already found expression in statements in the Ministerial press, it being urged that "We should discourage gifts to the British navy, and encourage the Dominions to build local navies."

THEATRE AUDIENCE SAT STILL WHILE FIREMEN FOUGHT FIRE

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—A motion picture audience in a theatre on Broadway sat unmoved to-day while firemen from the roof fought the flames that were raging on several floors of an adjoining five-story apartment house. Some of the firemen were at work just behind the screen on which the pictures were being thrown, and had passed through the theatre lobby to reach places of vantage. At the theatre manager's direction the orchestra played continuously, drowning the noises the firemen made. Two miles of Broadway trolley traffic was tied up for an hour as a result of the fire.
