On the morning of Saturday, Nov. 11, 1911, at the home of Isaac Smith, of North Wiltshire, there passed peacefully away to the home above, Leslie Wray, son of William Wray of Wheatley River, at the age of 17 years. Bred in infancy of his own mother's tender care Leslie was taken by Mr. and Mrs. Smith and given a place with their own children in their Christian home. Respected and loved by all who knew him he lived his brief young life not in vain, and at the last hour he was not afraid for he knew in whom he had believed. He had worked in Charlottetown for some little time, in the employ of G. H. Taylor, where his faithful and willing service won for him the esteem of his employer. But early in the summer failing health compelled his returning home, and though all that tender care and careful nursing could do, was done, his young life's brief hour was spent, and he has gone to be with God. The remains of the late Lewis McLaren, who was recently murdered in Glace Bay by an Italian, will arrive in this city this evening on the Northumberland, accompanied by his uncle, W. D. Coffin. The funeral will take place on Friday at two o'clock, p. m., from the Eldon Hotel, City, to the People's Cemetery. Mrs. J. R. Campbell, St. Peter's, the mother of the deceased is at present in this city and is the guest of her sister, Mrs. D. Livingston, Eldon Hotel. The account of the capture of the murderer of the deceased is related by an exchange as follows:—The Italian, Dominick Baptiste, who on Sunday last shot and killed Lewis McLaren at Reserve Mines was arrested Tuesday evening about five o'clock, at his home at Reserve, by policeman William Cameron. The man escaped on Sunday last after he had shot McLaren and has been in the woods ever since, and though a number of police and friends of the deceased have been searching night and day in the woods about the colliery they were unable to locate their man. This afternoon one of the men McLean, a fellow boarder of McLaren in the adjoining house, which is a double dwelling, opened the door of Baptiste's house saw the man sitting by the fire. He immediately notified the Colliery Officer Cameron who went to the house and made the arrest. Baptiste made no resistance and went quietly with the officer. He had a revolver or other weapon upon him when searched. He was taken to Glace Bay where he was confined in the town jail. The inquest into the death of Lewis McLaren resulted in a verdict of death by the hand of Anthony Garrow, alias Dominick Baptiste, on Sunday, Nov. 26. The jury made no recommendation. The body of McLaren was forwarded to his home in P. E. I., tonight by the express, for interment.

The following letter has been received by Miss Dorothy Auld, Free-town, from her brother Dr. Fred M. Auld, medical missionary in China, and will be read with much interest throughout this Province.
Wuchwei, Fu, on Oct. 25, 1911.
My Dear Sister:—
It is some time since writing you or indeed anybody else. When we get accustomed to our new country we find it just as hard to get news here as at home. At first everything strikes us as new, but now it is the same old story from day to day. We are pursuing our daily work as usual. You may probably have had news of trouble in China but it has not troubled us very much. The scene of the troubles are not near here. But this land is a boiling hot volcano, ready to burst out at any minute. To understand the situation you must know that the present rulers of China are not Chinese but are Manchurians and are regarded by the Chinese as foreigners. The government is in a fearful state of corruption. The leading Chinese are tired of it for this reason; and because it is foreign, they wish a republic, but are afraid to speak openly as the government executes them instantly if they express any sentiments of rebellion openly. Revolutionaries have been at work on the sly for years. They have now broken out at Hankow and Wuchang, where they have captured the latter city. The government is pouring troops and munitions of war there as fast as possible. The future is all unknown. The great mass of people are in sympathy with the rebels.
