MRS. JOHN A. MACNEVIN

A dark shadow was cast over Bonshaw and surrounding district on the morning of October 1st, 1937, when it was learned that Mrs. John A. MacNevin, had passed to that Great Beyond. Although in failing health for the past year, her condition was not considered serious until about ten weeks ago when creeping paralysis became evident, and on the above mentioned date her gentle soul winged its homeward flight, to be with Him in whom she put her trust. Early in life she joined the Presbyterian Church, and remained a true believer in her Church all through her life. All that loving hands, kind words and deeds could do, were done. She was lovingly cared for during the past winter and summer, by different members of her family, and when the end came, her two eldest daughters, who

never left her bedside during the last weeks, with her son, daughter-in-law, and niece, watched her gentle spirit return to him who gave it. Born in Pleasant Valley, P. E. I. seventy-eight years ago, she was the daughter of Alexander, and Jane (Bliger) MacDowell. Olivia came to Bonshaw the bride of John MacNevin sixty years ago, first living in the Village, later moving to a farm. Nine years ago she returned to the Village where she spent the last years of her life. There are left to mourn the passing of a dear mother, Hessel, Bonshaw, Mary (Mrs. Moore), St. Catharines; Alex, East Royalty; Jennie (Mrs. Anderson) Websterville, Vt. U. S. A.; Muriel (Mrs. McDougall) Liberty, Sask.; Olivia (Mrs. Langstroth) Jamaica Plain, U. S. A. Dorothea (Mrs. Blanchard) Brookline, U. S. A. and Stewart at home, a son Sidney, predeceased her fifteen years ago. There is also a brother, John MacDowell, Pleasant Valley, P. E. I., and two sisters, Annie (Mrs. Hazard) Providence R. I., and Lizzie (Mrs. Crozier) Halifax, N. S., 31 grand-children, and a great-

grand-mother to the children of 5 grand-daughters. There are also a large number of nieces and nephews. Her funeral which was one of the largest ever seen in the community, took place Sunday, Oct. 3rd, at 2 o'clock, from the home of her youngest son with whom she resided. The 23rd Psalm, Shall we gather at the River, and Jesus Lover of My Soul were sung at the service which was conducted by Rev. D. J. Morrison, assisted by Mr. Lloyd Henderson (Student) who spoke very kind words of sympathy and encouragement to the bereaved family. While the remains were quietly laid to rest in the family plot in Argyle Shore Cemetery beside those of her husband who predeceased her by 22 years, and her son, Bonshaw Choir sang in the Sweet Bye and Bye. The pall-bearers were: Messrs. Seymour MacLean, Elmer Crosby, J. N. MacDonald, L. T. Beaton, John MacPhail, and Hector MacNevin.

FEVER

The normal temperature of the skin of the human body is 98.3 degrees to 98.6 degrees Fahrenheit. It is often slightly higher in the mouth, while in old persons it is likely to be lower. When the temperature rises above 98.6 degrees the individual is said to have fever and many persons look upon a fever with alarm. This is particularly true when a mother finds her child in "a temperature" as doctors throughout the world can testify. But it is not strange that one should be alarmed because fever means that certain chemical changes have occurred in the body by which a person suffers more

or less severely and the elevated temperature is a sign that all is not well. Fever may be caused by any one of the following:— 1. The infection of the individual with germs, which the scientists call pathogenic organisms because they produce disease. 2. Toxins or poisons which cause fever quite apart from the germs which working within the body produce the toxins and poisons. 3. Severe internal bleeding. 4. Fluids which are liberated in the body as the result of a fractured bone. 5. Certain powerful drugs such as strychnine. 6. Exposure to extreme heat. 7. Nervous influences (shocks) which are severe enough to upset the centre in the brain which controls the body temperature. A thermometer will tell in a minute that there is fever. But what is the cause? That is the all-important thing to find out and that is why the physician should be called at once. Normal temperature is maintained by a proper balance existing between heat production and

heat loss. The wearing of more or less clothes, cooling off—perspiration—cold or hot drinks, these and many other factors so well known by all of us play their part in maintaining the proper heat balance. But in fever, heat production exceeds heat loss and no amount of aids will immediately change this because the normal processes of the body are upset. This may cause headache, a dry, hot skin, a furred tongue, rapid pulse and quicker breathing. A person with a fever should be in bed and remain there until the temperature is normal. Don't go about with a fever. You are courting disaster if you do because the cause of the fever may continue to do more damage while you heroically carry on thinking you can throw it off. Here are three things to do forthwith when fever is present. Go to bed, keep warm and drink plenty of water. Nature has provided in fever a definite indicator that something is wrong within the body. Your doctor, if

you call him, will discover the cause of the fever and apply the proper treatment.
