**Increased Stipend for
Clergymen**

Reporting parishes followed a report showing that despite industrial depression the largest amount in the history of the church had been given for missions by parishes. The Missionary Society of the Church in Canada appointment was paid in full and every clergyman in non-supporting parishes received the statutory amount of \$1,200. The gross receipts amounted to \$32,473.32. Expenditures were \$23,060.20, leaving a surplus of \$9,413.12.

QUARRELLING MEN JUMPED TO DEATH

NEW YORK, April 28.—The bodies of the two men who leaped from the bridge spanning the Harlem River at 145th street, last night were recovered this morning by Patrolmen Chichester and Ludwig, of the Marine Division, who were dragging the river under the bridge with grappling hooks. James J. Ryan, of 134 Bradhurst avenue, identified one of the bodies as that of his brother, John. The other body, which was found earlier, was identified by Ryan as that of Jack Langton, 24 years old, of 366 St. Nicholas avenue.

According to Isidore Oppenbergs, 5 years old, of 201 West 141st street, who was an eyewitness, two well-dressed men came out of a room near 147th street and Lenox avenue engaged in a heated argument. They seemed to have been drinking, Isidore told the police, and expecting to see a good fist fight, he followed the 145th street bridge with a number of other boys.

The two men still arguing, strolled to the centre of the bridge, with the boys about twenty feet behind them. The pair stopped suddenly and as one swung himself over the railing shouted to his companion: "Let's go Frank!"

The man called Frank swung himself over the railing and dropped into the river. A moment later his companion leaped and the amazed boys on the bridge heard two loud splashes after forty foot plunges. Isidore and his pals began to yell and attracted the attention of Harry Purcell, engineer of the draw-bridge. Purcell threw his searchlight on the river and saw that the strong current had separated the two men.

One was clinging to the bridge pier and mid-river while the other was trying to buck the current and swim to the Bronx shore a hundred feet away. Purcell heard the man clinging to the pier shout: "Come over here, Jack."

"I can't," the other replied as he fought the current.

Several boys went in search of a policeman, while Purcell followed the man struggling in the water with his searchlight. He shouted to the man clinging to the pier to hold on. The man shouted an inaudible reply. Purcell's grasp slipped under the water.

A few minutes later, while Purcell's light followed the man called Jack, who was struggling to reach the Bronx shore. Purcell saw him hrow up his arms and sink.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—The German reparations counter proposals are unacceptable as a basis for discussion, Secretary Hughes informed Dr. Simmons, the German Foreign Minister, in a note tonight.

The Secretary at the same time urged the German Government to make further proposals directly to the Allied Governments. He also expressed again the earnest desire of the American Government for a prompt settlement of "this vital question."

Pen Picture of A Successful Student

"The Wonderful, writing in the Winnipeg Tribune has the following about a well-known successful Islander in the West.

M. A. Brown, vice-president and chairman of the executive of the Western Canada Colonization Association, during one of his frequent visits on organization business. He was born on a farm on Prince Edward Island about thirty-six years ago. Early in life he entered a general store owned by Mr. (afterwards Senator) Frowse, but before long he joined the ranks of young men to Western Canada. By the time he had reached Medicine Hat he had become thoroughly imbued with the spirit of the prairies. While engaged in the business of a general merchant with stores at both Calgary and Medicine Hat he turned his attention to municipal politics, in order to fit the scope for the restless energy which has always distinguished him. Four times mayor of his adopted city, he was able to place the finances of that place on a solid financial basis, with the result that the credit of Medicine Hat stands very high even in these days of stress and strain.

Looking beyond the confines of his own municipality, Mr. Brown saw the need for developing the material resources of the province, with the result that he joined others in forming the Alberta Industrial Development Association, of which he became president. The investigations carried on by this association revealed the fact that industrial development must be proceeded by denser land settlement and increased agricultural production all over the prairies. The accumulation of a great war debt and the requirements of the Canadian National Railway, only served to drive his lesson home. The outcome of this conclusion was the formation of the Western Canada Colonization Association with the specific purpose of bringing under production some thirty million acres of vacant land contiguous to railways this side of the Great Lakes.

Mr. Brown gets the credit of originating this enterprise, and being the main factor in financing it by obtaining voluntary subscriptions

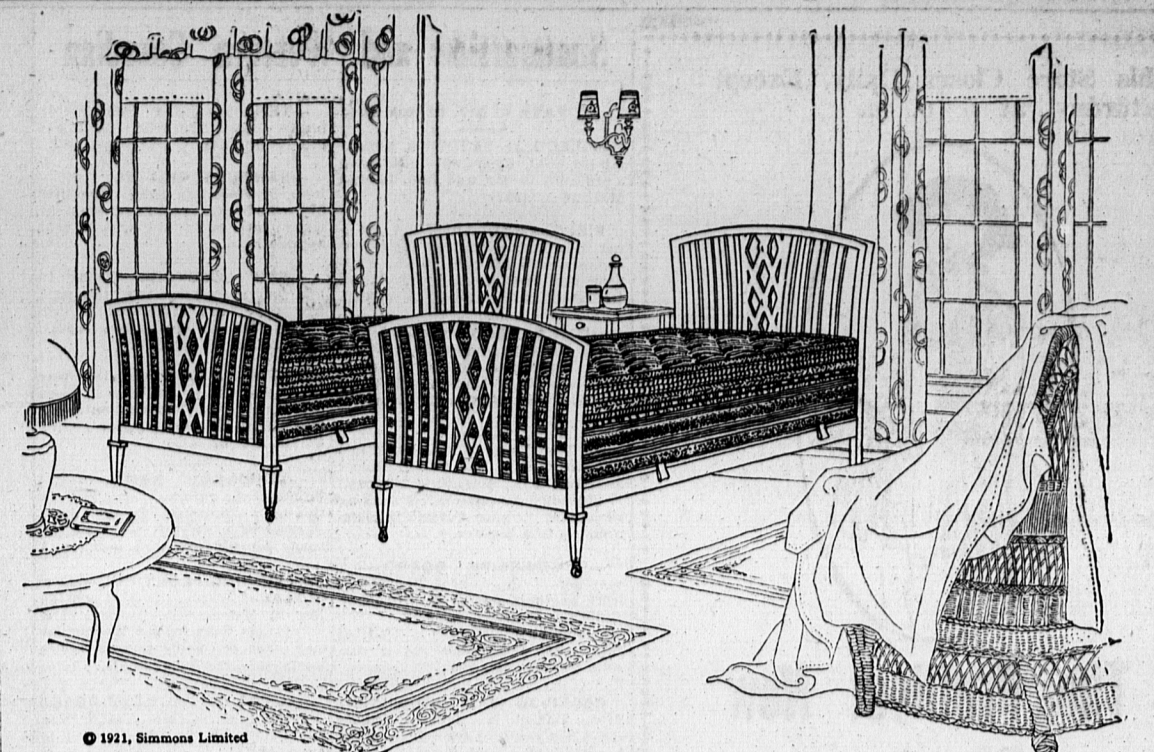
from wealthy individuals and corporations in the East, as in the West. The movement has enormous potentialities for the three prairie provinces, and especially for Winnipeg as the chief distributing centre for the West.

Mr. Brown is a type of a man who makes a good first impression. Better still, that good impression grows on acquaintance. He is a man out after the realities in life, and he is never satisfied unless busy with something for the benefit of his community or province something for others. He has tasted of large wealth, enough to gratify the desires of any man, but his spirit found little satisfaction in dollars—there was more to be done, and hence his public activity.

In appearance he is a man of medium height. His clean shaven face indicates strength of character. He thinks clearly and speaks effectively.

While mayor of Medicine Hat, Mr. Brown brought about a reorganization of the treasury, assessment and tax collection departments. He completely revised the city's assessment system, instituted an aggressive collection of tax arrears and made important reductions in operation expenses, commencing with the mayor's office and continuing down through the other departments to the bottom.

The next thing Mayor Brown did was to institute a new form of taxation to replace the uncollected assessments on unproductive vacant
