THE Northumberland arrived from Pictou at 4.15 yesterday afternoon.

MESSRS. POPE FLETCHER and George Moore made a fine catch of 29 trout at the harbor's mouth yesterday. One of the number was 16 inches long and 9½ in circumference. Many of the number weighed over a pound. A number of our sports say it was one of the finest catches they had seen for some time.

THE Foresters of this city will parade on Sunday next, 18th inst to Zion Church to attend Divine Service at 11 a. m. where an appropriate, practical, and inspiring sermon will be preached by the Rev. D. B. McLeod the esteemed pastor. The procession will be headed by Worth's Brass Band, and will leave the court room, Provesse brick block, north side of Queen Square, at 10.45. The following will be the route of procession: up Grafton to Queen, Queen to Richmond, Richmond to Zion Church, Zion Church to Prince, Prince to Kent, Kent to Queen, Queen to Grafton, thence to court room.

THE electric storm which raged Thursday was very severe in some parts of the province. At Winsloe Road three head of cattle owned by Mr. Fred Roberts separated from the rest of his herd and ran into a small bush for shelter. All three were killed by lightning, making a total loss for Mr. Roberts of at least \$90. One was a milk cow, one a steer, the third a fat heifer, and all were choice animals. Mr. Roberts' barn was also struck by lightning and partly damaged. The telephone lines are badly injured and no connection has yet been established farther west than Kensington. All around that locality the storm raged with fury. In Bedeque three cows were killed belonging to Mr. Stavert and Mr. McKenna.

After lunch Mr. and Mrs. McLeod drove to Charlottetown and took the westbound train yesterday afternoon on a wedding tour through Upper Canada and the Maritime Provinces.
