SERIOUS LOSS.—Mr. James Tuplin, Indian River met with a very serious loss on Tuesday morning when his grist mill and saw mill were totally destroyed by fire. It is supposed to have originated from the drying kiln. There was in the mill large quantities of grain and oatmeal and tools, etc. Nothing was saved.

THE ICE.—The frost of the past few days has completely closed in the waters of the Hillsboro River and a great expanse of ice is the result, although there is no traffic over it as yet. Thursday morning a team could be seen driving along the ice near Rocky Point, seemingly testing the strength of same, but it could not be ascertained if the driver crossed over to this side.

POLICE COURT.—At the Police Court in Charlottetown, Thursday, Law came up for hearing. The case of Ronald J. Steele, for a first offence against the act, was adjourned until the 18th instant. The cases against John McKenna, for second offence and Elizabeth McMillan, for fifth offence were each adjourned until January 22nd.

IMPORTANT MEETING.—On Friday, January 16th, a meeting of the Sheep Breeders' Association will be held in the Agricultural Hall at 1.30 p. m., at which several matters of considerable importance to sheep breeders will come up for discussion. It is very important that it should be largely attended. THE WORKING MAN.—At a meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association of Pictou last Sunday, Rev. E. M. Ramsay, who is a native of Port Hill and a brother of Rev. J. A. Ramsay, spoke before the men on the subject of Christ and the working-man. At no stage of the world's history has the person and mission of Christ been so vital in the thoughts of the world as at the present time. Rev. E. H. Ramsay, who discussed the subject, is a man of thought and practical action and his speech was very interesting between the influences of Christianity and the great modern industrial developments and was well prepared to deal with such a theme with thought and experience behind it. The teacher fittingly acknowledged the kind expressions of her pupils and tendered her most sincere thanks for the valuable gift. After the treating of candy by the teacher and general expressions of good will the school was dismissed for the Christmas holidays.

ROADS BADLY DRIFTED.—The snow drifts of Tuesday night did not improve the roads any but rather made them very difficult for teams to pass over. Several of the milkmen from the country districts were unable to get through to Charlottetown and consequently a number of people were minus their milk supply yesterday.

THE SNOW.—Wet ankles and shoes are the order of the day at present. During the past few days the snow has continued to drift over the walks roads and cross streets making travelling by foot or vehicle very unpleasant, though perhaps the latter mode of moving about is the most convenient considering that fourteen inches of snow, on the level, has fallen. In some places the depth reaches between four and five feet. There is indeed snow plenty.

LAD TO REST.—The funeral of the late William Murray, Charlottetown, took place Thursday morning from his residence to the pro-Cathedral, thence to the Catholic Cemetery. It was very largely attended by a wide circle of sympathizing friends and the pall-bearers were—Messrs. James Eden, T. B. Riley, L. C. Worthy, E. Cullen, Peter Trainor and (Ex.) Gov. D. A. McKinnon. The Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Father Peter Duffy and Father Frank McQuaid officiated at the grave.

THE MORWENNA.—The S. S. Morwenna, Capt. Holmes, which has been under charter to the D. C. Co. during the summer in the passenger service between Montreal, Sydney, St. John's and Charlottetown, has just arrived in Pernambuco, South America, with a cargo of 1200 tons, of fish from Avila. The steamer arrived at her destination Jan. 6, after calling at the St. Vincent, Cape Verde Islands, where she took on a bunker cargo of 3,500 tons. The passage of 20 days is considered a very fast one for this steamer at this season of the year, and especially since she encountered heavy weather in the north Atlantic.

ICE RACING.—A meeting of the hockey men of Charlottetown will take place in the Canada Fox Exchange on Saturday night at 7 o'clock. A large attendance is expected as the meeting will make arrangements for ice racing this winter.

ENTERTAIN VISITOR.—Mr. B. I. Raynor of Alberton spent last Thursday in Truro with friends. He was en route to Boston to attend a meeting of the International Fox Farms. While in Truro he was the guest of Mr. J. E. Sargent, and in company with Mayor Stewart, Dr. Randall and others was shown around the town. Mr. Raynor was delighted with the sociability of the citizens.

NO MAIL SPECIAL.—The mail special did not leave Charlottetown, Thursday morning for Summerside on account of the Minto not crossing to Tormentine. This special will likely discontinue running now on account of the Minto giving up the Summerside and Cape Tormentine route. The mail from the Minto was taken to Charlottetown by the train that went up Wednesday and which waited there.

THE COLD SNAP.—Citizens experienced the coldest snap yet this season on Wednesday night when the official thermometer fell to two and one-half degrees below zero. Towards morning, however, the cold somewhat abated and at nine o'clock it was one below. Upon enquiring at the experimental station it is learned that their thermometer fell to four below Wednesday night and at seven the following morning it was two below.

BIG CO. MEET.—The annual meeting of the Island Tug Company was held in the Board of Trade rooms Tuesday. Dr. James McMillan and Messrs. W. H. Aitken, Charlottetown and E. Boswell, Victoria, were elected directors. The shareholders expressed dissatisfaction with the progress of the S. S. Harland, which had not at all been profitable, and the new directors were instructed that if there was not better prospects this year to arrange to sell the boat. Some changes in the by-laws and routine business of the company was transacted and the meeting dispersed.

SNOW SHOE CLUB.—There is no outdoor exercise in winter more delightful or invigorating than snowshoeing, yet Charlottetown, the progressive, has no organized snowshoeing club. There are clubs for almost every other kind of amusement, exercise, or sport but so far snowshoeing has been indulged in on the individual plan. The conditions here for this form of pleasure are of the best, and quite a number own snowshoes. Why not get together and organize so that teams and outings may be arranged for? A snowshoeing party into the outskirts of the city on nights like the present with a supper at the end—what could be jollier?

TRAIN WITHDRAWN.—The following will be of interest to the P. E. Island travelling public. The management of the Intercolonial Railway has decided that trains Nos. 3 and 4 between St. John and Moncton shall be discontinued after next Wednesday. These two trains, one leaving St. John at 11.20 in the morning and connecting with the Ocean Limited for Montreal; the other connecting with the Ocean Limited from Montreal, are very popular trains, and there is likely to be serious objection to their withdrawal although it was done last year. The management announces that connection at Moncton with the Ocean Limited for Montreal will now be made by No. 2 leaving St. John at 7.10 a. m.; connection with the Ocean Limited from Montreal will be made with No. 1 arriving in St. John at 9.30 p. m.
