Irish Senate Passes Second Reading Of Bill

DUBLIN, July 20.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Without a division the senate of the Irish Free State tonight passed the second reading of the measure empowering the republican government to impose duties of any amount on British products, and rejected a motion to take up the remaining stages of the bill tonight.

The bill was introduced by the British Cates on Free State goods in effect since July 15.

As a money bill the measure could not possibly be blocked by the Senate, but the President Eamon De Valera rose to its defence in the debate tonight. The Free State constitution permits a minister to speak in either House.

"I have gone out of my way to meet the British," declared Mr. De Valera. "I have done everything possible except surrender the rights of the Irish people, and I am not going any further." He desired to avoid suffering in Great Britain as well as Ireland, but he declined to continue paying "the enormous tribute" of 5,000,000 pounds a year.

The President agreed the only way out of the dispute was by arbitration. "But let us have no restriction on the composition of the tribunal," he exclaimed. In his view the principle laid down by the British Government on this point completely misrepresented the whole intention of the peoples gathering at the Imperial Economic Conference.

Driven to seek alternative markets, people of the Free State who had been hungry would hunger no longer, declared Mr. De Valera, for there would be more food in the country and it was the business of the Government to see that hungry mouths were fed.

German Riots Take Heavy Toll

BERLIN, July 20.—(A. P.)—Bloody political brawls which have kept Germany in turmoil for several weeks impelled the Federal Government today to forbid all outdoor processions and demonstrations. The ban was published in the form of a stern emergency decree, in which the government reserves all further measures to itself and will "not hesitate in case of need to proceed severely against groups working with explosives and firearms, even to the extent of standing up against a wall and shooting those caught with firearms or explosives."

These extreme measures would be possible without invoking martial law, as civil courts would be speeded up to the limit to impose death penalties upon persons found guilty.

The Government decided on its demonstration ban after a week end of political rioting in which 15 persons were killed and scores were injured.

A ban against political uniforms was only recently lifted under pressure from Herr Hitler, and the Cabinet felt it could not reverse itself.

The Government admitted that "bans on uniforms and demonstrations were rescinded on condition that the election campaign would be conducted in an orderly manner, but this opinion was not fulfilled."

A new Reichstag will be elected July 31. The National Socialists have threatened to arm their "storm troops" if the government does not put down disorderly elements of the left, but the Cabinet has declared firmly that it will not tolerate the arming of any political organization.

The most serious clash of the week-end was at Altona, where 12 persons were killed and 50 injured in a battle in which 6,000 National Socialists and Communists participated.
