King Carl Hubbell, after giving up two runs in the first inning, pitched a shutout ball the rest of the way for his fifth win of the season against one defeat to the entertainment of a crowd of 30,343.

The Giants, who have scored exactly three runs in their last four games, were sparked by a 15-hit attack that buried Dutch Brandt, Bill Swift and rookie Truett Sewell.

Harry Danning contributed a homer with the bases loaded and a homer to drive in six runs. Jo Jo Moore hit a homer with two a-bats.

Philadelphia drove in two runs in the last half of the ninth to snatch a 2-1 victory from St. Louis Cardinals. The Cardinals scored their run in the first half of the ninth.

Bunt Lawless Is Winner Of King's Plate

TORONTO, May 22 (CP)—Name of a gallant colt, Bunt Lawless, branded the best since Inferno, was engraved today on the Canadian turf history-winner of the 79th running of the King's Plate.

Before a crowd estimated at more than 25,000 persons, greatest ever to view a renewal of the historic race, Bunt Lawless galloped to a handy mile-and-a-furlong victory Saturday at picturesque Woodbine Park, some of the plate since 1887.

He covered the distance in 1:54 2-5, one-fifth of a second off the plate record set by Horometer in 1934.

The undersized colt, barely extended in the stretch drive, rewarded owner Willie Morrissey's confidence and enthusiasm by a length-and-a-half triumph over Mona Bell, carrying the colors of the Costrage stable of Toronto.

Cabin Gal, owned by Harry Giddings of Oakville, was third, four lengths further in the rear. Grand Dame, owned by G. M. Hendrie of Hamilton, was fourth and H. C. Hatch's Caracole fifth.

After the race Bunt Lawless was taken to the winner's paddock where Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor General, presented Morrissey with 50 guineas, donated by the King. In addition Morrissey drew \$6,780 first prize. The total purse, after non-payment and starting fees had been added, was \$9,780.

Morrissey's total winnings, including the prize money and numerous side bets, were estimated as high as \$20,000. He won \$4,000 from a syndicate backing Hatch's suffering in a horse-for-hire wager.

Indians Increase League Lead Defeating Yanks 8-3

NEW YORK, May 22 (AP)—Cleveland Indians increased their American League lead to two games today by walloping New York Yankees 8-3 in a series-opener game in Cleveland which was costly to both sides.

Bob Feller retired after working three innings when he complained of the recurrence of a back injury, and Lou Gehrig, the Yankee iron man, pulled a charley horse on a double in the sixth inning and gave way to Babe Dahlgren in the seventh. It was Gehrig's 1,900th consecutive game.

For the second time in a week Rudy York hit home run with the bases loaded and gave the Tigers a 4-3 victory over Boston Red Sox in Detroit.

Manager Joe Crokin hammered out a home run for Boston in the second, but the bases were empty.

In Chicago, Ted Lyons, 37-year-old right-hander, scored his 300th American Baseball League victory today as the White Sox, defeated Washington 9-2.

The veteran knuckle baller yielded nine hits, one a homer by Jonathan Stone in the eighth inning, out after pitching himself out of jams in each of the first three frames he had little difficulty, it was his second triumph against no defeats in four starts this season.

The Athletics scored three runs in the 10th inning off Buck Newsom, who went in as relief hurler with two on, to defeat the Browns 8-5.

Who went the Browns ace pitcher, who went the full route to win over Boston yesterday, was not charged with the defeat, since Julio Bonetti had left him on the spot with one away.

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Garden Bowl Jinx Not Worrying Ross Who Will Meet Armstrong Thursday

NEW YORK, May 22 (CP)—The old bugaboo about the jinx Madison Square Garden Bowl has on champions was pulled out of the mothballs today with the approach of Barney Ross' defence of his welterweight title against Henry Armstrong, wearer of the feather crown.

No champion has ever successfully defended his laurels in the sprawling Long Island City saucer. Barney hasn't given much thought to the hoodoo talk but some of the boys who have wasted their money on champs in the bowl are hard to convince. Ross, despite his weight advantage, only rules 7 to 5 favorite to withstand the leather fists of his negro challenger Thursday night.

Ross himself is among the million men who have taken advantage of the jinx and also felt its sting. In 1934 he gained the welter title by taking Vancouver's Jimmy McLarnin, and then lost it back to the clotting Celt in the same arena.

Promoter Mike Jacobs hopes customers will fill at least 4,000 of the Bowl's 70,000 seats to what happens when good big man and a good little man meet. It will be the first time the lights have been turned on in the bowl for boxing since Jim Braddock walloped Max Baer to win the heavy title in 1935.

Never knocked off his feet in 200 amateur and professional ring contests, homicide Hank isn't worrying about the five or six pounds advantage his Jewish opponent will carry into the ring. Armstrong has 37 straight victories to his credit, 35 of them by knockouts. Eddie Mead, his manager, predicts his boy will add Ross to the K. O. list late in the 15-round tussle.

As a two-year-old, he was a work horse, starting 35 times and winning five. Last season he raced 15 times and with four appearances to date in 1938 he has paraded a total of 77 times.

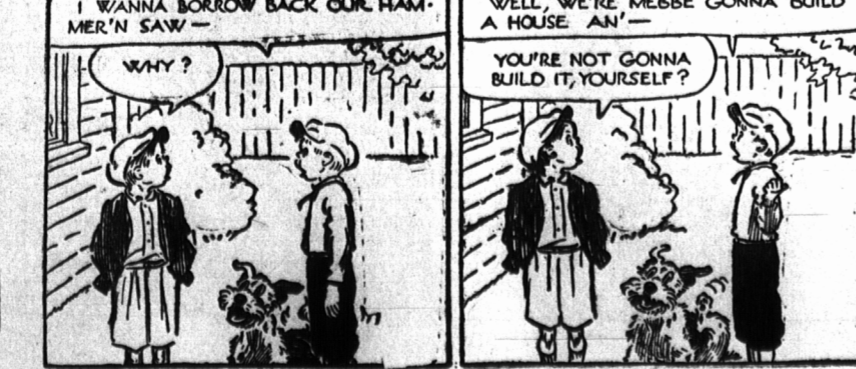
