SENATE REFORM.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's scheme of Senate reform as propounded by him during the recess, is likely to come before parliament during the present session. Its main feature is that in the event of serious difference between the two houses, as where the Senate rejects a measure which has passed the Commons, the two houses may meet together and the majority of the joint vote will decide the question at issue. Something similar in its general features is provided in the constitution of the United States and in the proposed constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia. In the latter case the provision was apparently inserted because of the difficulties which Canadian experience has shown to be likely to arise.

To effect the required reform in the Canadian Senate the British North America Act must be amended by the Imperial Parliament. Amendments to the Canadian constitutional Act when thought necessary are usually asked for by joint address of the two Houses of the Canadian Parliament. But the federal ministers know very well that a majority of the Senate as it now is could not be obtained in favor of the required joint address. The method of procedure that has been adopted is to secure a pronouncement by as many of the provincial legislatures as possible in favor of the projected reform.

The legislatures of Ontario, Manitoba, and Nova Scotia have already spoken in favor of the change and notice is given in our own legislature of a resolution to be moved of the same purport. For some reason not explained no similar resolution was brought up in the Quebec legislature at its late session, though a Liberal Government is in power in that province. In British Columbia and New Brunswick, where the administrations are of a composite character no action has been taken.

The apparent intention of the Ottawa government is to secure a vote in the Commons in favor of a constitutional change along the lines above mentioned, and on that basis, together with the resolutions adopted by three or four of the local legislatures to ask the Imperial Parliament to amend the B. N. A. Act as they desire. The action of the Australian conference might also be expected to have some weight in England.

The result of an appeal to Great Britain under these conditions will be doubtful. The majority of the Senate, and for that matter the majority of the great Conservative party in Canada, will stoutly oppose the change. The Conservative party is in power in the United Kingdom, and there the proposed reform of the Lords has been a matter of party conflict, with Lord Salisbury a champion for the Upper Chamber as it is. Under such conditions the Canadian Senate is not likely to be left without defenders in the Imperial Parliament.

Women on the school-boards of Charlottetown and Summerside will presently be an accomplished fact, the leader of the opposition having gracefully endorsed the government's proposition to that end. THE GUARDIAN congratulates the ladies on their approaching admission to a share in the work of administering a most important branch of the public service.

The army and Navy Gazette of Lodon warmly commends the efforts of Major General Hutton to improve the Canadian militia. That distinguished officer had spent three years in Australia in a similar position before coming to Canada and therefore knows something about the relations of colonial governments to the question of defence. The Army and Navy Gazette states that the people of Canada with a frontier of 3,200 miles to defend have hitherto paid less toward defence than any people in world. That Journal represents military technical opinion, and it pronounces the Canadian militia force as it is as practically useless, but believes that the reforms proposed by General Hutton will transform the militia into a military force "worthy of the Canadian nation, and which if necessity called, would render a fair account of itself."

The local opposition have made a political blunder in their attitude of resistance to the Hillsborough bridge. It will require a lot of explanation on their part to satisfy the people interested, and it could have been foreseen that the opposition to the bridge must be fruitless. Mr. Martin, M. P., can hardly be pleased with the mistaken action of his local allies.

The weary Dreyfus case is shortly to enter upon a new phase. It is to be permitted that the demand for a revision may be publicly argued before the united sections of the Court of Cassation about May 29. This will bring out a full statement of the case on both sides. It is expected that the counsel will occupy four days at least in their arguments, and that the decision of the court may be made on the second or third day of June. This public hearing may do much to further extend the revulsion of feeling in favor of the most unfortunate prisoner.

Some features of the report of the commission of inquiry in regard to provisioning the American army in the late war are of interest. General Miles was the originator of the charge that the provisions were not what they should have been. He was entitled to credit for this, but the members of the commission afford him scant praise. They say his charge that the refrigerated beef had been treated with chemicals was not proved, and that if he knew the beef was bad he was "in error" in not reporting the matter at once to the Secretary of War; This is mild censure, however, to that bestowed upon General Eagan, as Commissary General whose conduct is characterized as "unwarranted and reckless," his mistakes as "colossal" and admitting of "no palliation." Still the distinctive feature of the report is its manifest animus against general Miles. The beef seems to have been undoubtedly bad, but not so extremely bad as was at first reported.
