### Paris Story Says Explosion Was Premature

PARIS, Nov. 5 — (Reuters) — What is purported to be an account of an unsuccessful Russian atom bomb test is printed today in the Paris newspaper Figaro. The copyrighted article says the bomb exploded prematurely.

The account of the test is said to be based on the information of a former Russian general staff officer, Captain Silov, now reported to be working in South America as an engineering chemist after leaving Russia with false papers.

Prime Minister Stalin and Marshals Timoshenko and Voronov were said to have been present at the test.

Timoshenko, 63, was commander-in-chief of the Red Army on Soviet fronts in the last war.

Voronov is an artillery expert and directed the artillery operations against the encircled German Fifth Army at Stalingrad.

Two bombs, manufactured at Sterlitamak and Altai, were reported to have been tested.

Sterlitamak is in European Russia, about 500 miles northwest of the Caspian Sea and 370 miles southeast of Kazan. The Altai Mountains are in Asia near Outer Mongolia.

The bombs contained only 50 grams of atomic explosive.

"The explosions took place prematurely," Figaro says, "in the sense that engineers had anticipated a delay of 15 minutes." This "serious defect" upset the possibility of an immediate manufacture of delayed action atomic bombs.

Figaro published a report in February this year that the first atom bomb made by Russia—a delayed-action type—failed to explode when tested secretly in a Ural forest Aug. 19, 1947.

The Paris newspaper L'Intransigent published a report from a special correspondent in Moscow Nov. 11, 1947, which said the Russians exploded their first test atom bomb June 15, 1947, in Siberia.

When the L'Intransigent report was published many American and British scientists expressed their skepticism.

Officers said the plane was last heard from at 4:12 p.m. E.S.T. when it attempted ground control landing at Harmon Field. They added that the weather was "very bad."

A report from St. John's, Nfld., said a United States plane was reported to have crashed tonight within a 100-mile radius of Argente, the American navy base at Southern Newfoundland.

Seven United States Navy and Coast Guard air rescue planes are scheduled to start search operations at daybreak.

Air rescue units are standing by at Harmon Field and Westover, the Air Force said.

OTTAWA, Nov. 5 — (CP)—The Canadian Poultry Council will ask the Government to help find new markets other than the United Kingdom for some \$10,000,000 worth of Canadian eggs next year.

The Council said in a statement tonight that Britain has been buying Canada's entire surplus production since 1911, but now her contracts with Canada are "obscured by monetary difficulties between the two countries."

The possibility was seen that unless the Government acted, the price of eggs on the domestic front would drop suddenly and sharply.

George Monaghan, assistant district attorney, said that Ralph Barrows was the only suspect involved in the murder of MacKellar, 56-year-old general manager of the Dominion Textile Company, Limited.

MacKellar was found early today beaten to death in his two-room Canadian Club suite.

Barrows, described as six feet tall, dark-haired and well-dressed, was taken into custody at 6:15 p.m. tonight.

### Move Made To Take Garson Into Cabinet

### Hon. J. A. Glen Resigns Manitoba Seat Of Marquette.

OTTAWA, Nov. 5 — (CP) — Acting Prime Minister St. Laurent today made the first move towards bringing Premier Garson into the Cabinet as Justice Minister.

He announced that Mr. Garson has accepted an invitation to "associate himself" with the Liberal Party in the Federal field and disclosed that Hon. J. A. Glen, former Resources Minister, has resigned his Manitoba Commons seat of Marquette to facilitate the entry of the 49-year-old Premier into the Federal House.

Mr. Garson, elected as a Liberal Progressive in Manitoba, heads a coalition government composed of Liberal Progressives and Progressive Conservatives.

By-elections will be held Dec. 20 in Marquette as well as in the Quebec riding of Leval-Two Mountains and the Ottawa district seat of Carleton. Nomination day in the three ridings will be Dec. 6.

George Drew, the new Progressive Conservative leader, will seek a Commons seat in the Carleton constituency.

While Mr. St. Laurent did not say outright that Mr. Garson would enter the Cabinet, his appointment to one of the portfolios — likely Justice — is regarded in political circles here as a foregone conclusion. Mr. St. Laurent himself has been serving as Justice Minister on a temporary basis since Rt. Hon. J.L. Ilsley left the Cabinet in June.

Observers here pointed out that Mr. St. Laurent's appointment is expected just as Mr. King resigns and turns the ministry over to Mr. St. Laurent. Mr. King's week-end and may leave office sometime next week.
