Nitler Speaks To Veterans Of Munich Putsch

LONDON, Nov. 8 (CP)—Hitler admitted in a speech today that "some people in Germany may believe in an enemy victory" but declared that "war will be fought fanatically to the end".

Addressing his old Nazi cohorts in a Munich beer cellar, he demanded loyalty and war-readiness, and said he would show no mercy in liquidating a few hundred criminals.

Soviets Took 60 Villages From Germans

LONDON, Nov. 8 (AP)—The Red Army smashed through 60 villages today in pursuit of the remnants of 12 German divisions routed from wrecked Kiev, killing 1,600 more enemy troops and striking to within 115 miles of the Polish border and 140 miles of Rumania.

A Crucial Situation

A German radio commentator said: "A situation is developing which is regarded as crucial by both belligerents."

German Losses

The special Russian announcement giving details of the battle for Kiev said 12 German divisions, two of them tank divisions and one motorized, were routed.

War Situation Last Night

A new Russian trap designed to destroy all Nazi forces in southwestern Russia or force them in demoralized flight into toiling satellite Rumania is shaping up today west of recaptured Kiev.

The obvious minimum objective at which Red leadership is aiming in this blow is to squeeze all Nazi forces south of the Pinsk marshes to the Black Sea out of Russia and into wavering Rumania, cut off from all direct communication with Germany via Poland. The maximum goal is destruction of at least a third and possibly a half of the German Army in Russia.

The Moscow newspaper Pravda, in telling of the German flight beyond Kiev, said the Germans threw away weapons, ammunition and even clothing, and that many were trampled to death on roads jammed with moving and wrecked vehicles.

Says Pullman Service Being Urged Vigorously

The withdrawal of the Pullman service to and from Prince Edward Island has been "taken up vigorously with the railway authorities" by Col. J. L. Ralston, Minister of National Defense, according to word received from Col. Ralston by the City Council and read at last night's monthly council meeting.

A letter was read from the clerk of the Executive Council, enclosing a minute approving of the appointment of Mr. J. A. Bentley, K. C., as acting Stipendiary Magistrate during the absence of Magistrate S. M. Martin.

A letter from Dr. Tadazek Brzezinski, Consul General of Poland, was read and placed on file, suggesting the organization of a branch of the Canadian Friends of Poland in Charlottetown.

8th Army 30 Miles South Of Pescara

ALGIERS, Nov. 8 (AP)—Allied forces advanced relentlessly toward Rome today, the British Army reaching a point less than 30 miles from the port of Pescara on the Adriatic Sea from which a good highway runs across Italy to Rome, and the Anglo-American 5th Army driving hard on Gaeta, 70 miles southwest of Rome.

The Germans apparently were destroying Gaeta's Harbor facilities in the face of imminent Allied occupation.

From their front-line positions nine miles from Gaeta, British fighters of Lt.-Gen. Mark Clark's 5th Army heard several great explosions in the city, evidently from mines set off by the Nazis. Gaeta is the best port between Naples and Civitavecchia, north of Rome, and would be of supreme value in supplying the next stage of the campaign for the Italian capital.

ALGIERS, Nov. 8 (AP)—At least 170,000 gross tons of Italian warships, as well as 149 Italian warships and many miscellaneous small craft, already have been brought under Allied control, an Allied headquarters announcement said today.

LONDON, Nov. 8 (CP)—Kassel has ceased to exist as part of the Nazi war industry, for some time at least, the air ministry said tonight after studying new reconnaissance photographs of the heavily bombed Ruhr industrial city of 200,000 persons.

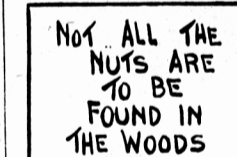
