SKIPPER IS MONARCH WHEN ON THE SEAS

BOSTON, Mass., February 5.—The rule of the seas that a skipper has exact obedience of his orders aboard ship was upheld in the Federal Court today when Captain John McPherson of the steamer Winnebago was discharged after a hearing on complaint of Christian Karlsen, able seaman, that he had been beaten while in irons at the hands of a bruising captain and bully mate. Testimony indicated that the assault followed Karlsen's refusal to scrub the decks upon which the word "starvation" had been chalked.

### HELD AS SLAVE IN MEXICO

NEW WESTMINSTER, Feb. 4.—A strange tale of imprisonment and slavery in a salt mine in Mexico was unfolded to the immigration officers at the international bound a few days ago when they picked up Edwin G. Kehoe. His statements having been substantiated, Kehoe was admitted to Canada and given transportation to New Westminster. Kehoe is a native of Quebec, and graduated at Edinburgh University as a civil engineer. In 1908 he took a position with a Mexican oil company and four years later was forced to take sides with one of the revolutionary parties then warring on the western slope. Captured, he was thrown into a vermin-infested prison and later in a salt mine. During all that time he did not hear of his family or friends who were suffering in Europe. Three months ago the opportunity to escape arrived. Hitting his guard on the head with a rock, he scaled the 800-foot shaft and made his way across the American boundary, from whence he came north by foot and blind baggage.

### Billiard Cracks Are Matched For \$1,000 a Side

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—One thousand dollars was posted here today by R. B. Benjamin, representing Willie Hoppe, the world's professional 13.1 and 18.2 ball line billiard champion who is now playing in Canada to bind a match of 1,000 points up with Edouard Horseman's the Belgian expert for the 18.2 ball line title. Hoppe's manager stipulated that the match must be played in this country during October or November next and will put up a stake of any amount from \$1,000 to \$5,000.

### Moncton Pros. Win Over New Glasgow

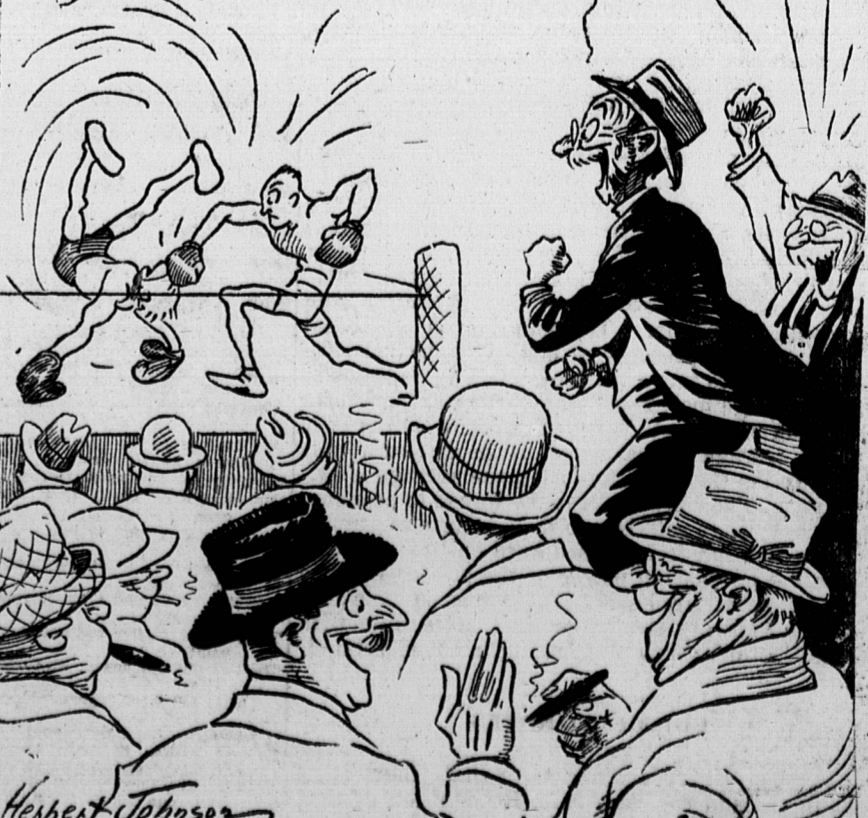
In a One Sided Game Last Night the Victorias Defeated New Glasgow Team 8 to 3
