THE ISLAND TEACHERS VISIT PRETORIA

They Receive the Greatest Courtesy—Visit a Gold Mine in Johannesburg—Kruger's House—Travel With DeWet and Steyn—Convention Instructive and Enjoyable.

The following is a few extracts from letters written by one of our Island teachers while attending a three weeks' teachers' convention at Johannesburg: Another day was pleasantly spent in Pretoria. We visited Kruger's home and were shown all through it. Everything was just as he left it even to his large bible which still laid on the table. The house was quite plain, also his church across the street. We were photographed on his veranda. During the day we were shown by General Littleton's wife the table upon which peace was recently signed. Returning from Pretoria a special car was attached to our train which aroused our curiosity. At one of the stations we learned the two passengers who were the cause of so much interest were Dewet and Steyn. As they promanaded past our car we had an excellent opportunity for seeing them. Our Convention has been quite instructive as well as enjoyable. During the mornings we attended lectures given by leading educationalists and in the afternoons and evenings excursions, concerts and drives kindly arranged for us passed the time pleasantly. It was good to meet our fellow passengers from Canada once more, also those who had come before us; and to hear the varied experiences each is having in their new work. We return this week to "our homes" in Bloemfontein ready for the pleasant work before us.

PROPOSED GREAT AUSTRALIAN RAILWAY.

A Line of Nineteen Hundred Miles North and South to be Built Through the Island Continent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 28.—Consul-General Bray at Melbourne, informs the state department that capitalists and railroad plant builders in the United States will be interested to know of the proposed transcontinental railway from Adelaide, South Australia to Port Darwin, North Australia. The South Australian government will introduce a measure in Parliament early this season offering capitalists facilities to build this line. The description circulars which have been sent to the state department set forth the advantages possessed by Northern Australia for stock raising, and there is need of railways to transport fodder and stock. The Government of New South Wales and Queensland will extend existing lines to form links in the transcontinental railway. The length of the entire line from Adelaide to Port Darwin will be about 1900 miles and the country offers no engineering obstacles.

where he should go, especially when men have definite places in view. There is nothing, however, in this year's arrangements that will prevent men from going to their friends or to those for whom they worked in past years, if they advise such friends or farmers that they are coming, so that such friends and farmers do not engage others. "The fare to Winnipeg is \$10. On presenting stub of coupon to C. P. R. officials on arrival at Winnipeg a pass is given to any point in Manitoba and away men go to destination. They can take care of themselves for they have been there before. Their baggage would also be rechecked from Winnipeg to destination. For those who have never been here to help in harvesting and who have no particular place to go, we are arranging that they shall be met at Winnipeg by delegate farmers from all points in the province and taken out to their various districts. This is to prevent congestion at all stations. A pass is also given to all such from Winnipeg to destination. "You will see, therefore, that there is no interference with men who know their destination, and that every assistance possible is to be given by the officials of this department in locating those who may come to assist us for the first time. There is nothing therefore, to deter any one from coming. They are wanted, and they will receive every attention possible." It is hoped that the Eastern Canadian press will put this matter in its proper light, so that no one may be deterred from going for it may be readily seen from the above letter that men will be allowed to go to whatever destination they desire, without interference and those who have no special preference will be assisted in every possible way.
