THE GOVERNOR GENERAL AND FAMILY AT HALIFAX

Received with Military Honors and Popular Cheering—The Oath of Office Administered—Addresses Presented on Behalf of Province and City—Women's Council Address Countess Grey.

HALIFAX, Dec. 11.—(Special)—The S. S. Parisian arrived at one o'clock Friday night and the Viceregal party landed Saturday forenoon, being received with military honors.

Earl Grey expressed his thanks for the welcome. It was, he said, but another evidence of Canadian devotion to His Majesty and he would do all in his power to convey their kindly feelings to the King.

On Saturday afternoon the Women's Council presented an address to Countess Grey, who hoped to be able to assist in their work.

At the close of the ceremony His Excellency had created a distinctly favorable impression. He is tall, of fine presence, erect carriage and has keen black eyes combining sharpness with kindness of expression.

In reply to the address from the city of Halifax His Excellency responded that there was not a single Governor General who had not declared that the five years spent in Canada were the happiest in his life.

On Sunday morning the party attended St. Luke's Cathedral where Bishop Morrell preached. In the evening Their Excellencies were guests at a dinner given by Sir Charles Parsons and left for Ottawa at midnight.

COMPLETION OF WORK ON CURTIS CREEK LINE

FIVE ARE LOST IN SHIPWRECK

Four Might Have Been Saved Had they Stayed on Board—A Tale of Suffering by Storm and Cold—Frozen to Death.

HIGHLAND LIGHT, MAST, Dec. 12.—(Special.) Four members of the crew of the Boston fishing schooner, Fish Hawk lost their lives last night while attempting to leave their vessel which was ashore and pounding heavily on the Peaked Hill bars, north end of Cape Cod.

Five others including Capt. Bly had a terrible experience during six hours in a small dory, but all loss of life would have been averted had the men remained by the vessel.

The schooner had a miraculous escape from Cape Cod's deadly trap and within four hours after flood was safely in harbor. The dead seamen had jumped into a dory and it immediately capsized. They were drowned before the eyes of their companions who were unable to render assistance.

Captain and five others got into second dory and had scarcely left schooner when she glided off into smoother water. Those remaining on board worked her into harbour at Provincetown.

INSURRECTION IN ST PETERSBURG

St. PETERSBURG, Dec. 12.—(Special.) An anti-Government demonstration planned for to-day resulted in one of the fiercest riots in some years. Despite the warnings printed in all the papers throngs of people gathered near the Cathedral and the Police were compelled to make extensive preparations against the disturbance.

Students of both sexes joined the mob. Bodies of police appeared and endeavored to keep back the tide of humanity when suddenly a squadron of Cossacks appeared and charged mob slashing right and left with their sabres.

All warnings were fruitless and at a signal given by the waving of a red flag enormous crowds shouted "Down with autocratic rule!"

The front rank of the revolutionists stood for only a few moments but the Cossacks continued slashing until blood flowed freely and hundreds were wounded.

Hundreds of red flags appeared and the populace moved towards the palace.

The incident, which assumed great proportions is regarded most seriously.
