Two young girls are dead and the father and one son are in the City Hospital as the result of a fire which, breaking out in the early hours of yesterday morning, completely gutted a three-story dwelling house at 214 King Street.

The dead are Phyllis Larkin, 16, and her sister, Hilda, age 13. The injured are Mr. Joseph Larkin, painter and decorator, who, before leaping from a second-story window, wrapped his seven-year-old daughter, Marie, in a blanket and dropped her safely on to a snowbank below; and Joseph Jr., 18, who sustained a broken wrist and other injuries when he leaped from a third-story window. Both are in the City Hospital.

Fourteen-year-old Eddie, also jumped from the same window but had the force of his falling struck some telephone wires in his descent. He is the temporary guest of neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. Wilfrid Mahar, 213 King Street. His sister, Marie, is with Mr. and Mrs. C. J. MacLean, 220 King.

The fire was first noticed by Joseph who awakened his father and the others of the family. With the exception of the two girls, Phyllis and Hilda, all had made their escape from the burning dwelling when the Fire Department arrived.

In the meantime, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Murphy, who occupied one part of the house, were awakened by two friends, Miss Bertha Huestis and Mrs. Wanda Gallant, both

of Summerside, and guests of Mr. and Mrs. Murphy. The girls had been visiting friends and had arrived back about 1:40 a.m. when they saw the fire. Mr. and Mrs. Murphy succeeded in saving a few pieces of furniture after being awakened before the fire drove them out.

An alarm was sent in at 1:55 a.m. by Mr. C.J. MacLean, 320 King Street, and the Fire Department arrived at 2:01 a.m.
