**THE NEW SAVINGS BANK.**

Magnificent Building to House the British Post Office Savings Bank in London—Cost \$315,000.

The new Postoffice Savings Bank, situated at the rear of Olympia, near Addison road station, London, says Lloyd's Weekly Newspaper, is a magnificent building. It covers an area of a little over four acres, and cost just over £270,000 to build, the ground having been acquired for £45,000. The front of the building faces Blythe road, the main entrance being in the form of three arches leading into a quadrangle. The style is that of the Renaissance, and the materials used are Portland stone and red brick. On each side of the arches, which are almost entirely of

stone, is a domed tower, and between these towers is a campanile which, with a big clock-face, will be illuminated at night. The building will accommodate 4,000 persons, and there are three main rooms, each 350 feet long and 50 feet wide. Everything is right up-to-date in the way of appliances, the kitchens, dining-rooms, cloak rooms, day and recreation rooms being on the upper floors. On the ground floor accommodation is provided for a thousand bicycles, an ingenious system being adopted to allow of the taking out of any one machine without disturbing the others. The erection of the new premises has taken close upon four years, the King having laid the foundation-stone on Midsummer day, 1899.
