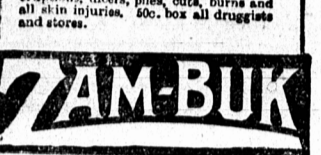

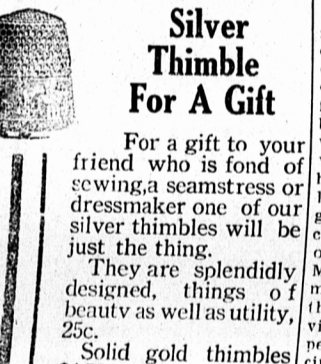

THE STEAMERS.—The Earl Grey left Georgetown yesterday morning at 7 o'clock and succeeded in docking at Pictou at 4.40 o'clock in the evening. She had on board 108 tons freights and 75 passengers, and will leave on return to Georgetown this morning. The Minto leaves Georgetown at 7 this morning for Pictou.

HELPING THE MISSIONS.—In Church Notes published in a recent St. John Exchange, the following interesting tribute to local missionary zeal was paid:—"St. Peter's Cathedral congregation, Charlottetown, P. E. I. puts most of us to shame by the manner in which it contributes to missions. Last year that small congregation of only 298 souls gave \$3,064, or \$13 per capita to the missionary work of the church."

AGED MAN DEAD.—There passed away at Upton on the third inst. after three weeks illness, Alexander Hayden in the 92nd year of his age. Mr. Hayden settled at Upton about sixty years ago where he conducted a grist and saw mill business for many years. His wife predeceased him about twenty-three years ago. He leaves one daughter (Annie) at home to mourn her loss.

PHYSICAL TRAINING IN SCHOOLS.—Through the medium of the various cadet corps throughout the Dominion there is likely soon to be an unmistakable evidence of a forward movement in physical training in schools. The Militia Department, with the indefatigable Colonel Hughes at its head, is making great effort than hitherto has been made, in this direction; and one scheme towards this end is the carrying out of a special course in physical training at Ottawa under the auspices of the Militia Department. The course began this week, and will last eight weeks; it will consist of lectures on scientific gymnastics, hygiene and practical training in an extended series of exercises. With a more thorough system of physical training for the cadets, not only will these corps reflect greater efficiency but the same desirable results will extend to the schools; physical efficiency in the scholars must certainly have beneficial effects on their scholastic efficiency.

THE PRINCE EDWARD.—A better audience could not be wished for than attended the Prince Edward Theatre last evening attracted thither by the announcement of the tableaux to be staged there, and to hear Mr. De Witt Cairns in the song "O Canada." The object of these special features of the program was to instill into the minds of those present the above mentioned song which has now become the National Song of Canada. The tableaux were put on during an intermission in the picture program and formed two very beautiful, patriotic scenes. When the curtain went up first there was presented to the view of the audience a monument—a representation of the one in the Queen Square Gardens erected to the memory of the Peareberg heroes. On the top of the foundation of the monument a member of the South African Veterans was posed. During the time that this was being shown the lights in the house were put out and a red spot light turned on the scene. This was greeted vociferously. The curtain descended and Mr. DeWitt Cairns came on the stage and started the song "O Canada" playing the accompaniment. The curtain rising as he sang the second verse till there came to view the final of the tableaux. The performers were arranged in a semi-circle on both sides of the stage. The first row was formed of young ladies in white with an inner row of gentlemen, a row of Cadets with bayonets, and a final row of small girls waving flags. Every member of this represented some occupation or inhabitant of the Dominion. At the front of the stage there were veterans and at the back Britannia was represented by a lady in silver with a helmet on her head and bearing a sceptre on which she leaned. As Mr. Cairns sang the members of the tableaux, joined in the chorus. At the finish of this performance the audience cheered and cheered to the last echo. Everyone who attended the show was presented with a souvenir of the entertainment, the song, "O Canada" nicely printed on a little folder.

REV. DR. D. J. FRASER ILL.—His many friends will be sorry to learn that Rev. Dr. D. J. Fraser, formerly of Alberton, and now Professor of New Testament Exegesis in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, is ill with pneumonia. While recently applying for a brother clergyman near Montreal he contracted a cold which developed as above. It is gratifying, however, to learn by last reports to his people in Alberton that he is improving.

BRIDGE-BUILDING.—Within the last week the local Department of Public Works has completed the building of two more steel and concrete bridges in the province, thus pushing further progress towards finishing the big program of bridge-building which it undertook last year. The two bridges completed recently are those at Mink River and Bay Fortune. For the present year the Department does not contemplate any extensive activities in the construction of new bridges similar to those undertaken last year; in fact, except as exigency may demand, it is so intended to complete those bridges which were taken in hand last year, but owing to intervention of the winter season, remain to be finished. In this direction there is a good deal of work to be done. One of these unfinished bridges is the big one over the Cardigan River. The approaches to the Montague bridge and to several other bridges throughout the province are also to be made up this year.

REBEKAH LODGE INSTITUTED. A new Rebekah Lodge, to be known as the Acme Lodge, was instituted at Montague on Wednesday afternoon by special Deputy of the Grand Master, Miss Mary Essory, assisted by Mr. John McLaughlan, Deputy Grand Master, Miss Bertie Stewart, Grand Secretary, and Mr. David McKinnon, Grand Marshal. In the evening thirty-nine of the forty-five members were initiated by a Degree Staff from the Alpha Rebekah Lodge, Charlottetown. The following officers were elected for the new Lodge:—Noble Grand, Miss Jacqueline Macdonald; Recording Secretary, Mrs. P. M. McMillan; Financial Secretary, Miss Annie Sutherland; Treasurer, Miss Lillian Macdonald; Secretary, Miss Lillian Macdonald; and the officers were installed by Deputy President, Miss Mary Essory; Sixties, Winchester, Stewart, Howe, and Henderson, and Brother McLaughlan. After the business meeting in the evening dainty and substantial refreshments were served to those present. The proceedings closed with a dance which was enjoyed immensely. About forty went out from Charlottetown to Montague and were royally received by the people there, of whom they can not speak too highly for their great generosity and kindness.

P. E. I. P. A. MEETING.—The annual meeting of the P. E. I. Poultry Association was held last evening in the Agricultural Hall. The following officers were elected: President, R. V. Longworth (re-elected); Vice-Pres. for Queen's John Whitlock, for Prince Vernon Matthews, for King's Gerald A. McCormack; Directors: Wm. J. Cudmore, Harry Laphorne, Lorne Pigott, John Wannacott, L. A. Hassard, A. F. Houston, Arthur Nelson; Secretary, George Lightizer (re-elected). The matter of electing a superintendent was laid over for another meeting. The Secretary presented his annual report which was received and adopted. Although the attendance at the last show was not what it ought to be, and the receipt from that source very small, still the prominence given to the utility section at the request of the Department of agriculture enabled them, with the assistance of the department, to pay prize money in full. The assistance thus given was very greatly appreciated. Already this Association is planning for the next show and if the good feeling that exists amongst the members at present continues and they carry out their intentions of treating all exhibitors, utility men included, in the fair and reasonable manner proposed, their future seems to be assured.
